Highlights from the Minutes of the Eaton Bray Parish Council Meeting - Held on 4th December 2006

NEW COUNCILLOR:

The Chairman welcomed Maria Crace as a new Parish Councillor. Maria completed and signed the Acceptance of Office of Councillor and Notification of Financial and Other Interests.

PUBLIC FORUM:

Mr. S. Willis addressed the council with reference to a letter he had received from SBDC in response to his complaints about the District Council Planning committee's response to their objections to a planning application for land adjacent to Bower Lane, and the incorrect representation of the area of Greenbelt land to the rear of 20-23 Medley Close. Mr. Willis does not feel that the letter explained the anomaly. The Clerk had not received a response to the PC's letter requesting an explanation.

CHAIRMAN'S CORRESPONDENCE & COMMENTS.

A note of thanks from the Poppy Appeal organiser for the donation of £75 for wreaths, a total of \pounds 1,512.11 had been raised in the village.

Copies of Alarm Notification Order leaflets from SBDC, giving details of the new order effective from 26th Nov.2006 that requires owners of commercial and residential properties fitted with burglar alarms to register keyholder information with SBDC not later than 24th Dec.2006.

A report giving the crime figures for November as follows: Total of 16 offences -1 aggravated burglary, 1 criminal damage, 3 criminal damage to vehicles, 3 miscellaneous theft, 3 other burglary (allotments etc.), 1 criminal damage to a building, 1 assault, 2 theft from shop, 1 theft from motor vehicle.

A letter requesting permission to erect a flagpole for a St. George's flag. The council asked the GP committee to investigate this further and to bring recommendations to the council.

A letter from Mrs. S. Hounslow, Head of Eaton Bray Lower School, informing the PC of their success with gaining the approval of Beds. C.C. for the planned nursery building. The PC was asked to grant permission for parents to temporarily park cars in the neighbouring park car park, and to allow for a new pathway through the hedge to the back of the school. It was unanimously agreed to give the council's approval in principle but to request further information concerning the expected use of the car park and the need for the new path.

DISTRICT & COUNTY REPRESENTATIVES:

County Councillor Brian Piggott addressed the council with an outline of some of the implications following from the recent White Paper on Local Government Reform, highlighting the moves towards a two-tier system across the county.

EATON BRAY & EDLESBOROUGH CARNIVAL 2007:

The PC propose to have a stall at the 2007 carnival to provide the opportunity to meet members of the public and Councillors from Edlesborough in an informal environment.

Skateboarding.

This is being researched; the young residents making the request are to be invited to the next GP meeting.

Allotments.

The GP committee proposed that markers should be placed showing the position of each plot.

VILLAGE HALL REPORT:

Mr. Norman Lee addressed the council on behalf of the Village Hall Committee, and stated that Phase One of the improvements was now completed.

As a result of the improvements, there had been an increase in booking income, which together with careful management, reducing running costs by approx. 17%, had led to a much better financial

position. Successful fundraising gave sufficient reserves for Phase Two of the improvement programme, which will provide upgraded rest room facilities with better disabled access.

It was also reported that recent storms had caused considerable damage to the roof and other areas, but the hall was still "open for business". This damage would be the subject of an insurance claim.

FENCING ADJACENT TO R. OUZEL BRIDGE:

The Chairman opened the quotes for work to replace fencing, and advised the council of the contents.

It was agreed unanimously to instruct Aaron Fencing to proceed with the work.

PARISH COUNCIL WORKING AGREEMENT:

It was agreed to amend the appendix to the working agreement that deals with the Parish Clerk's hours of work, the new arrangements are as follows:

The Clerk will normally be available during the following hours:

E-mails. The Clerk may be contacted using email, an email will be sent to acknowledge receipt. The Clerk's response will be as for telephone messages.

CLERK:

It was agreed to add Cllr. M. Crace to the Lloyds bank account mandate.

The new allotment tenancy agreements have been distributed.

The Clerk reported that the annual fire extinguisher tests had been carried out.

The council was advised that redecoration to the Coffee Tavern cottage was now complete, and a new bathroom suite installed. The next step is to purchase carpets and curtains.





If the headlines are anything to go by, 2007 did not get off to a very bright start. We emerged from our Christmas festivities into reports of the deteriorating situation in Iraq and, indeed, throughout the Middle East, to dire predictions about global warming, underlined by some unusually mild winter weather, to alarm stories about crime and criminals, and lots more gloom. The news always seems to be the bad news these days. You have to dig deep to find good news.

It is easy to condemn the media, but sometimes the church suffers the same problem. To many people the church seem over-preoccupied with $\sin -$ usually other people's – and human frailty, and rarely seems to say anything about the good things that are happening. Part of the reason for focusing on sin is so that we can rejoice in the wonder of forgiveness and the joy of a new start, but in modern times that's not "news".


The only contact a lot of people have with the church today is at times of difficulty and sorrow – in serious illness, or personal problems, or at a funeral. This makes their picture of the church one-sided. Just as the newspapers and the television shift our perception of life by concentrating on bad news, so this limited encounter with the church can give the impression that it is only concerned with the down-side of life. And the media don't help. It's always possible to find a religious leader who will come on the air to condemn something, but how often do they even bother to look for one who will praise some new initiative or invite us to celebrate success and achievement.

One of the Bible stories Christians traditionally read early in the New Year is the story of Jesus at a wedding. It starts with a problem: the hosts ran out of wine. But in the story as St John tells it (chapter 2) Jesus made new wine for the assembled company from the water standing in the huge jars that stood ready to wash the feet of travellers. The first thing Jesus is recorded as doing in St John's Gospel is making people happy and sharing in their joy. Later on in the Gospel Jesus says "I have come that people may have life, and have it in full abundance". There's something to correct the melancholy imbalance of contemporary life. In the Christmas story the angel tells the shepherds "I bring you news of great joy – joy for all the people", and the church should be a community of joy, the joy that flows from the assurance of God's never-failing love and mercy.

There is joy all around us, if we're prepared to look for it. There are plenty of things to celebrate, and we need to share our celebrations with one another instead of keeping them all "private". It is easy to look back at times of difficulty and see how a sense of community was created out of shared adversity, but shared joy and celebrations strengthen and renew family- and community-life. We need to look for the good things of life. We need to talk about them and share them with others. We need to celebrate them. Weddings are among the most obvious such occasions, and even they are becoming fewer and fewer. But Jesus at the wedding feast reminds us that life is meant to be enjoyed, and there are good things all around us.

So, even though it's a bit late, may I wish you all a truly **joyful** New Year. MALCOLM

Church Mouse



Edlesborough Book Group LABYRINTH by Kate Mosse



We approached Labyrinth by Kate Mosse, author and broadcaster, knowing that other readers had seemingly either loved or loathed this hefty tome of 697 pages. Unfortunately, the majority of our group fell into the latter category which led to a discussion regarding slick marketing and authors' reputations.

Mosse lives in Carcassone, south west France, and her novel concerns its medieval past and the persecution of the Cathars, a Christian sect who lived within its city walls. Mosse admits Labyrinth is "in some ways my love letter to Carcassonne" with its "mountains, hills, rocks, woods as much characters in the story as the people, real and imagined."* But we felt this passion for historical accuracy, theological analysis and intense detail of setting and character was its downfall with members needing to refer to earlier pages to confirm 'who was who' and 'what was what'! The novel opens in 2005 with amateur archaeologist, Alice, slipping into a French mountain cave where she finds two skeletons and an ancient ring with a labyrinth symbol. Her sense of the supernatural is compounded by someone calling her name. Yet it sounds strangely like "Alais", a French medieval name and here Mosse creates the link between the modern and the medieval, with contemporary lives recalling and echoing medieval ones. So the novel moves between past and present as Alice and twelfth century Alais each recognise that their destiny is to keep safe the secret of the labyrinth and so safeguard the true Grail from villainous Grail seekers. The reader too is seemingly caught in the twists and turns of a labyrinth as memories and truths, misunderstandings and betrayal, murder and revenge emerge.

Yet despite such excitement of a seemingly page-turning plot, most of us felt Labyrinth lacked momentum and it was generally agreed that this was due to poor technique and a clumsy writing style. <u>http://us.penguingroup.com/static/rguides/us/labyrinth.html</u>

New Year Resolutions – Forgotten Already?

Remember Harry, who had been a widower for years and didn't even leave a Will? Well, his nephews rearranged how things were to be shared out almost 18 months after he died. All their relations are really pleased they did'.

Edlesborough - What's in a name?

Penny Sydenham's letter - "Putting Edlesborough on the map" (December/January Focus) stimulated memories of the not too distant past when Summerleys, Two Counties Mill (now Waterside and Mill End Close) and all of the area of Moor End west of the mill race, were in the parish of Eaton Bray, in South Bedfordshire District, in the County of Bedfordshire. Those were the days of Kingsnorth's grocery and general store and Buckrod's amazing hardware emporium where you could ask for and buy anything from a couple of screws and a gallon of paraffin to a timber roof truss, without having an eyebrow raised in protest.

This parish divide continued until some time in the early 1990s when the Boundary Commission - a curious government agency the job of which is to mess about with long standing and entirely satisfactory administrative boundaries to no apparent public benefit - descended upon Eaton Bray and Edlesborough. Why this area was chosen remains unclear, at least to me. Presumably the Boundary Commission had to demonstrate to its political masters, a Conservative Government of the time, that it had found suitably fruitless ways of spending the taxpayers money allotted to it, and couldn't find anywhere less in need of change.

Whatever the reason, the boundary was changed and Summerleys and adjacent areas became parts of Edlesborough, Aylesbury Vale and Bedfordshire. But, what's in a name? In this case quite a lot. Suddenly, those children in the area who attended middle and upper schools in Bedfordshire lost the right to travel into Dunstable on the school bus, for example.

There were other difficulties - we no longer had access to a locally based County Councillor. Our representative on Bucks County Council seemed invisible and distantly based - Pitstone as I recall.

From that time onwards any inquiry that necessitated a visit to the District Council offices required a lengthy journey to Aylesbury rather than a short trip to Dunstable. Further, the relative remoteness of Edlesborough from Aylesbury seemed to be accompanied by much more attenuated and unreliable public services - in particular a shambolic refuse collection service and the end to street cleansing. The first of these has improved subsequently but the latter service has ceased altogether from the time of transition and I have not seen a street cleaning vehicle in Summerleys since.

"Not much to be upset about there then!" I hear you say - and you may have a point. But the residents of Summerleys do pay a price for the convenience of having shops at the end of the street, and that price is litter. It seems that whenever a customer purchases goods from the local shops the first thing they do is to remove the wrapping and chuck it on the ground. Something about the form of the buildings around the junction seems to mean that, whatever the wind direction, most of this discarded rubbish gets blown along Summerleys and ends up in people's gardens or under their cars, or, and this goes for the majority, lying in the gutter. We get plastic drinks bottles, ice cream, lolly and chocolate bar wrappers, cigarette packets, carrier bags, and the bits of newspapers that nobody wants to read.

Becca's Letter from Uganda

Hello once again. I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and New Year. Some of the hospital staff sent their thanks and best wishes for Christmas as shown below.

This will be my final letter for a while, although I will continue to keep you updated on how your money is being spent and write yearly updates about what's happening in Kagando.

I'd therefore like to take this opportunity to thank you once again for taking an interest in Kagando. For giving your time to read these articles, choosing to support us as your charity for this year, and responding so amazingly. I've been overwhelmed by your generosity. I've been so amazed and challenged by God since being out here, particularly as far as money is concerned. I've never been in a position where I've had to rely totally on God for his provision. I've been blessed in receiving so much. This has enabled me to bless others through giving. I've seen people praying for needs and how God has provided for them and in turn, they've been able to bless others. There's a real sense of how God is in control and all it needs is for people to listen and respond. This is the same for Kagando. Our director at Kagando once shared with me, how he often worries about the hospital and finances; where the money is going to come from, to pay things like staff salaries and medications. Yet time and time again God provides and how it humbles him to be reminded that he's not in control here but God is. So thank you once again for listening and responding. I think it's such a great thing that you are doing as a church/ community in greatly assisting different causes each year. It really makes a difference, and I pray that you are blessed through what you are doing. £1307,37 of the money you have raised has so far been spent on:

• **Pulse oximeter** – This measures the amount of oxygen in the blood, and the heart rate. It's great to be able to monitor a sick patient and has been really effective so far in prompting the nurses in the care of these patients.

• Manual suction pump – This is used to remove secretions from the lungs in patients who are

unable to cough it up themselves. This is really important as if secretions remain in the lungs they can cause a blockage and reduce the amount of air entering and leaving the lungs.

- **Resuscitation cupboard, Laryngoscope blade and sterile drum** These were purchased to complete a resuscitation kit for the surgical ward. If a patient arrests then time is the essence so it's important to have these things readily available for the doctors to use. They should be put in place this month and training done.
- **Path** This path joins the surgical ward to the leprosy and fistula ward and the physio department. The three wards often work together, so it's great to have a path going between them. As a physio department we are very excited as it's been a nightmare trying to get mobility impaired patients, who really need physio, to the department to carry out proper treatment. In the past the absence of a smooth path has often meant that we have been unable to offer physio where it is most needed.

We are also planning to purchase a Continuous blood pressure monitor, and possibly an oxygen concentrator. This will mean that you will have equipped the surgical ward with an "intensive care" bed for the very sick patients, built a path and helped to establish a resuscitation cupboard. This should total about £2,000 (or £3,500 with the oxygen concentrator) and will result in many lives being saved that would otherwise have been lost.

If we receive any extra money (for example from the money raised from Gordon's Christmas Puzzle) we would like to put it towards an electricity project. At present our power is supplied by hydroelectricity. This is great when there is lots of rain, but in the dry season there are times when the hospital is without power. During these periods a large generator is used, but it is old, inefficient and often breaks down; we are, therefore, looking at purchasing a new generator. We are also hoping to set up an inverter system in each ward. This will have batteries, which store electricity that can be used when there is no power to run lighting and some machines.

I will be in Eaton Bray on Monday 5th March, where I will be giving a presentation about Kagando. If you are interested in attending please contact Gordon Gray on 220136 so a suitable sized room can be booked.

Thank you once again for your support, interest and prayers. Please continue to pray for us as we try and reach out and serve this community.

If our earthly parents or families haven't communicated this to us we can often end up with feelings of insecurity, and suffer from the awful feeling of being "so alone".







Edlesborough Book Group NEVER LET ME GO by Kazuo Ishiguro



Kazuo Ishiguro's latest novel is set in the 1990s but its story line is futuristic. The majority of our group enjoyed the narrative although some members, who had read previous works by this author, felt his writing style to be rather formulaic. This provoked a lively discussion regarding writing styles which then took on an ethical dimension as we debated the concept that Ishiguro's fiction could so easily turn into fact.

The book opens with the character of Kathy H who, using first person narration, tells us she has been a 'carer' for twelve years. She explains that although this is an unusual length of time, it is because she is good at her job. Indeed she is now allowed to choose her 'donors', many making their third or fourth 'donations' before 'completion'. By using familiar words to introduce unfamiliar concepts, Ishiguro skilfully introduces a sense of the sinister; a dark undercurrent to Kathy's childhood memories and present lifestyle which fuel the novel's momentum. Kathy reminisces about her upbringing at Hailsham, a boarding school set deep in the English countryside. She describes life there and her particular friendships with Ruth and Tommy together with their emotional highs and lows. Yet as the story unfolds, tantalising questions arise such as why are these children so special? Why are their artistic skills so important? Why is their physical wellbeing checked so regularly by their guardians/teachers? Cocooned from mainstream society, these children are unusual in that they do not speak of holidays from school, homes or parents. Instead we spookily learn that Hailsham is their total world and somewhere in society there is a 'model' for each child. We become increasingly involved in their lives as they develop into young adults, sexually active but each accepting their own infertility. And so too do they courageously but frighteningly accept their destiny: the reason for their existence.

Most bookclub members found this a sad and moving tale but others were disappointed by the characterisation and remained outside the emotional aspects of the novel. Still it was felt to be an intriguing and technically satisfying read. Kashuo Ishiguro has introduced some scary concepts and the possibility that such deeds are already being implemented, if not in England then somewhere else in the world, was a sobering thought as we embarked upon our refreshments!
