



St Mary's Parochial Church Council Meeting

St Mary's Parochial Church Council met on 8th March 2007, at All Saints' Church Dagnall.

Last year's Financial Statements were signed, in preparation for the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 17th April, and members were reminded that activity reports for the Meeting would be required by 23rd March. The PCC re-confirmed its 2004 decision that publicity for fund-raising events other than those sponsored by St Mary's Church, would be confined to the Church porch, while publicity inside, and on the pew leaflet, would be limited to events sponsored directly by the Church. The Meeting also decided that money raised by the Open Gardens event, to be held on 10th June 2007, would be split between the Chilterns Multiple Sclerosis Centre (this year's project) and the much-depleted church roof fund, provided there was no objection by the participating garden owners. We were also advised that the Friends of St Mary's would be holding an open evening in the Church on 24th April, with the theme "We need friends!".

The meeting then reviewed progress following the recent Away Day, which had addressed various matters over which members of the congregation had expressed concern. Three groups had been tasked to consider different aspects of the problems identified, although considerable areas of overlap had become evident. Their reports led to wide ranging discussion covering opportunities for following up christenings, confirmations, weddings etc, involvement with village schools and other activity groups, making services more attractive – particularly to children and young parents – and contacting new arrivals in the villages. The groups were encouraged to continue their activities with the aim of arriving at specific proposals.

Finally, the outgoing PCC agreed to have one further meeting (on 12th April) before the APCM elects its successors.

The Church Mouse

Rebecca Baldock in Eaton Bray

On Monday 5th of March St Mary's Eaton Bray was blessed by a visit from Rebecca Baldock whose work, at Kagando Hospital in Uganda, we have been supporting throughout 2006. Rebecca has returned to England for her annual holiday and to share in the celebrations, in York, of her sister's 18th birthday but she took the time out of a busy schedule of talks and appearances to come to Eaton Bray to say 'Thank you' for the support the Hospital has received from this community.

In a fascinating illustrated talk, that included pictures of the beautiful landscape and wildlife, she brought home, with personal stories, the enormous need that the Kagando community addresses. Among heartbreaking stories Rebecca gave us some inspiring examples of the hope that Kagando is bringing to the local people. And she described how Christian community who run the hospital witness to the power of prayer in meeting their needs.

Rebecca described the ways in which money donated from our villages has aided Kagando Hospital. Some of the equipment is literally life saving and as a result of our support the hospital's two intensive care beds are now equipped with some of the basic equipment, such as a blood pressure monitor and an oximeter, that we take for granted with the NHS. Whist this equipment is vital for the hospital more basic needs have also been met by our donations – a simple path has been built that replaces the steps and rough ground between the main surgical wards and the physiotherapy department. As a result there is no longer a problem getting wheel chairs between the two and patients on crutches or callipers are now able to reach the physiotherapy department.

At the end of the evening Rebecca was presented with a cheque for £2,060, bringing the total amount donated to Kagando by the congregations of St Mary's and All Saints Dagnall from their



fundraising activities in 2006 to \pounds 5,291. She was so very thankful and carried with her the thanks of many of Kagando's nursing community.





We are often told that it is not possible to believe the Easter-story in a scientific age. Just because an event is without precedent and without parallel in human experience does not mean it could not have happened. The true scientist will sift the evidence carefully and evaluate it, and draw conclusions from the results.

The joyful Easter-proclamation of the Church is that Jesus who was put to death by crucifixion and whose corpse was hurriedly buried in a tomb nearby, was raised to life again on the third day after all this happened. The evidence for it is what is recorded in the Gospels, the effect it had on the original band of disciples, the existence of the Church, and two thousand years of Christian belief and worship.

Central to the Gospel-stories is that the disciples found the tomb empty. If they had gone to the wrong tomb, it would have been easy enough for the authorities to open the correct tomb and prove their claims wrong by producing the body of Jesus. The same could have been done had the authorities themselves removed the body for fear of what the disciples might do.

Had the disciples themselves removed the body and hidden it, then everything else they did would have been a conscious lie, and one of the most amazing facts about the Easter-story is the change in the lives of these men, all of whom deserted Jesus in His hour of need. Within seven weeks they were standing up in the city proclaiming that Jesus was alive, and they devoted themselves to spreading that message all round the world, even at the cost of their own lives. People don't do that for something they know is untrue.

Some people have claimed that Jesus did not really die on the cross but merely fell unconscious, and revived in the cool of the tomb and made His escape. But tombs were sealed by large stones which would be impossible to move from inside. And when we consider all that Jesus had endured less than two days previously, even had He come round He would have been a mangled invalid. Moreover, Roman soldiers were professional and experienced as executioners, and historical records as well as the Gospels show us the lengths they went to to ensure that an executed criminal was indeed dead.

It has also been suggested that the appearances of the risen Jesus to the disciples were some form of hallucination or wishful thinking. But again this is hardly adequate to explain the change in those disciples in such a very short time, and it certainly cannot explain the long tradition of witness of Christian men and women down the ages who have known the presence of a living Lord in their lives.

There are good grounds, therefore, for accepting the evidence of the Gospels and Christian tradition, and in that conviction I invite you to share with us in celebrating the resurrection of Jesus in church on Easter Day, and I pray that we may all experience His living presence and power as we try to serve Him day by day. "Jesus is alive" – that is the jubilant conviction which brings hope and joy into our lives. Blessed be God who has given us new hope and new birth in raising Jesus from the dead.

Edlesborough Book Group



Review of To Kill a Mockingbird

The group read To Kill A Mockingbird by Harper Lee last month. It was an old favourite for some of us and those to whom the book was new agreed it was a compelling, powerful read.

The book is set in a sleepy Alabama town of Maycomb in the 1930's and is narrated in the first person by Scout Finch, the daughter of a reasonably well off lawyer, Atticus . Scout looks back in retrospect over an unspecified number of years after the events of the novel took place.

We thought the most important theme of the book was the moral nature of human beings - that is whether people are essentially good or essentially evil. This was developed through the growing up of the three children in the story from their childhood innocence, in which they assume that people are good because they have never seen evil, to a more adult perspective, in which they have confronted evil and incorporated it into their understanding of the world.

Harper Lee's deft touch, bringing in a variety of incidents that expose the evil side of human nature, is linked with parenting, moral education, social class and prejudice.

The discussion centred on these themes and was lively, especially in relation to education and poverty.

All thoroughly enjoyed the book and felt it was just as powerful now as it was when published in the 1960's .We all admired Atticus, and felt he would have been an interesting father.

The mockingbird comes to represent innocence and thus to kill a mockingbird is to destroy innocence.





The 2007 season

Edlesborough Cricket Club welcomes new members of all standards and abilities for the 2007 season. The team's home ground is on Edlesborough Green and competitive matches start in late April, although pre-season indoor net sessions will be taking place prior to this.

The team will again play in the Aylesbury & District Midweek Cricket League, starting in early May, and weekly outdoor practice sessions will commence on Edlesborough Green in mid April.

Review of 2006

As usual, the club fielded a Saturday league side, a Sunday friendly side and a Colts team for the 2006 season, with overall wins and losses in the total of 40 matches played ending up precisely balanced. For the second year in succession, the Saturday side ended up with a record of 6 wins, 6 losses and 6 games drawn or abandoned in Division 2 of the Morrant Four Counties Cricket League. However, despite finishing mid-table, the closeness of the competition was such that relegation remained a possibility up to the last game, when Edlesborough resolved matters with a 7 wicket win over Olney Town in which one of our promising young teenagers, Andrew Kight, scored a crucial 99 not out.

The most consistent batsmen over the season were Jaco Jacobs, who averaged 47.1, and Matthew Merrick, on 40.8 and with the season's highest score of 126 in the home league win over Simpson & Walton, in which he turned the game around in a stand of 132 for the fifth wicket with Les Thorne (63 not out). The other two centuries of the season were both scored by Jaco Jacobs, who hit 111 not out in the home friendly win over neighbours Eaton Bray and 107 not out in the away friendly at Bamville, in which he and Paul Mortimer (52 not out) won the match with an unbeaten stand of 173 for the fourth wicket. However, perhaps the most pleasing aspect of the season was the batting performances of the two youngsters Andrew Kight and, in particular, Chris Kimpton, both of whom were still playing for the Colts in the previous year. Chris's batting has always looked good, with stylish on-drives through mid-wicket, but he only really began producing the runs in mid July. On one key weekend he scored 52 not out in the Saturday league win at Eggington, followed by 97 in the Sunday friendly loss against Mentmore, and never looked back thereafter.

The bowling throughout the season was relatively undistinguished, with not a single 5-wicket haul being achieved by a bowler in a match. In terms of wickets taken Edlesborough relied heavily on Jaco Jacobs, whose 46 for the season averaged 18.7 runs each. Supporting him, Matthew Merrick chipped in with 19 at 19.8, Chris Deciacco, who could only play occasionally, with 14 at 18.7 and Mark Brown with 21 at 31.2. Now that Barry Jenkins has (mostly!) retired, Edlesborough urgently need another good spinner to complement Mark. The one bright spot was that the bowling of two or three of the Colts who played frequently for the Sunday friendly side showed distinct promise. Development of this will be vital for the future success of the club!

For the first time in a number of years, the Colts played in the under 15 (East) section of the Aylesbury & District Midweek Cricket League, where they acquitted themselves well, winning 4 of their 6 matches and finishing in third place in a division of 7 teams. The batting was generally solid, with the team posting at least 100 in all but one of the 20-over league games, and Declan Hall and Chris Mortimer each scoring 30 or more in the games against both Long Marston and Winslow. Almost the entire team was involved in the bowling, with the best individual performances being James Kight's 3 wickets for 6 runs against Long Marston and Andrew Scott-Lewis's 3 for 20 against Ivinghoe & Pitstone.

Leighton Linslade Croquet Club

L.L.C.C. was formed in the year 2000 in the Council Offices of the White House in Leighton Buzzard by a small group of interested people and Council representatives. At this meeting it was decided to form the club; a small committee and Chairperson were elected, and the Council agreed to provide the club with a lawn and a store for equipment, etc. In due course the Council also supplied the new venture with two sets of hoops and two sets of balls.

In 2005 the club was successful in winning the East Anglia Croquet Federation trophy, having managed to first win the Area League, then the Federation semi finals and final. In 2006 the club organised the East Anglian competition, arranging all the Area League clubs, then supervising and refereeing the semis and finals. Unfortunately we were narrowly beaten to a place in the semi finals.

In the 2006 season our average membership for the year was about 50, and we had two near full size lawns and one full size lawn, all situated around our clubhouse where we have a water and electricity supply. Together with the Council we have raised enough funds to extend the smaller pair of our lawns to full size with a pathway between them. Both lawns are also to be fenced. Due to the very wet winter season, it has unfortunately not yet been possible to start this work, but we have been assured that work will commence as soon as conditions permit. A full size lawn is 35 by 28 yards. Our lawns are situated adjacent to the pavilion in Pages Park.

There are two recognised versions of World Croquet. The original game is known as Association Croquet and is usually played by two people, with just one person at a time on the field of play. Each individual can occupy the lawn until they break down whilst playing a recognised sequence; when this breakdown occurs the opponent then takes the field, rather as in a game of billiards, and so the order of play continues. These games usually take some three hours minimum. England are World Champions at Association Croquet.

The game we play is called Golf Croquet and can be played as singles or doubles; in club play it is usually doubles. Games normally lasts for 30 to 45 minutes depending upon the skill of the players and are completed when one pair - or, in the case of singles, one person - runs the best of 12 hoops or 13 if there is a draw. This game is very much more sociable as all players are on the lawn for the entire course of the match. We have three lawns and each is able to be used with two sets of balls, which means that we are able to accommodate 24 players at any one time. The Egyptians are current World Golf Croquet Champions.

We are becoming very active in the LU7/LU6 area and have become involved with taking our sport to schools, resulting in a Leighton Buzzard school that is forming its own club as an after hours' activity. In the near future we hope to approach charitable organisations for funds to provide a

fourth lawn at Pages Park, and to further promote the sport to the younger members in the area. Our committee has recently agreed to purchase mallets suitable for younger players. If a school wishes us to pay a visit, please contact our Chairperson Mrs M.J. Brown, Telephone 01525 373860 for further information. We will bring along the necessary equipment.

We are a very social group and have organised a social club for our members and their friends during our closed season, usually from early October to early April. This club meets in the Pages Park Pavilion and this year is from 10am to 12am on Wednesday mornings. At this club we play table tennis, darts, snooker (1/4 size table), board games, dominoes, card games, etc. Please see our announcement in this issue of



Focus for further details concerning our club and its activities.

An Introduction to Bee-Keeping

My name is Angel and I am a local beekeeper. During the following months I will be reporting the successes and failures of my beekeeping season, I hope this will be informative as well as enjoyable.

Beekeeping has been around for a long time, it is a much loved craft for many people, not only is it enjoyable (minus stings) but it brings the benefit of exceptional produce: honey, pollen, propolis and wax, however the most important contribution to nature by the bees is pollination. Many crops and fruits would not be able to develop without the help of these small insects.

Most bees are kept in wooden boxes called hives. The hives are full of frames where the bees build the honey comb in which to store honey and pollen as well as the brood which will become the future bees. It is a highly organised environment (50,000 bees in high season) where everybody has a task to perform with the queen bee at the helm.

The beekeeping season kicks off with the association GM at the end of February. It is an enjoyable event were you can meet old friends and talk about bees etc. as well as buy bits and bobs from the association stores.

Back in the field, hives are assessed for food stores and if needed, fed with some fondant.

During warm days bees can be seen flying from the hives so there may be an opportunity to have a quick look inside the hive.

All the equipment is checked and prepared and the beesuit washed so everything is ready for action.

I will be explaining how the bees work as I go along, as beekeeping is such an extensive subject, in the meantime if anybody wants some more info please e-mail me at <u>huelamo47@aol.com</u>

PCSO Funding

A conflict of opinion has come about between Thames Valley Police and the Parishes regarding the amount of time spent by the PCSO in the Parish compared to the Parish Council funding. Edlesborough, Pitstone and Ivinghoe Parish Councils are extremely concerned that they will not be receiving 100% of the PCSO's time and a meeting is being arranged between the Parishes and Thames Valley Police to clarify the situation.

Police Matters

Dangerous parking has become a serious problem in Edlesborough particularly on Saturday mornings whilst football matches are being played. Cars are parked wherever they can, on corners, both sides of Pebblemoor and blocking residents' drives making it impossible for any emergency vehicle to access Pebblemoor etc. The Police are making patrols and the Parish Council request that car drivers of both home and away teams have more consideration when parking their cars and remind drivers that the car park at the rear of the Pavilion is available.

The continuing problem of anti-social behaviour appears to be increasing and the PCSO is doing all she can to combat the situation.

Dog Fouling/Litter

The amount of dog fouling not picked up and put in the Dog Litter bins is becoming a serious health hazard. There are many pedestrians who walk across The Green, small children playing and sports activities taking place and the Parish Council would remind dog walkers who do not pick up dog fouling are liable to a heavy fine. The Parish Council spend over £3000 a year for the bins to be emptied as a means of keeping the Parish in a clean, tidy and healthy state and would ask that Dog Walkers either use the bins supplied or bag and take away.

It has been observed that some of the ordinary Litter Bins around the Parish are being filled with 'domestic' waste such as disposable nappies, washing power and fabric conditioner containers. These public Litter Bins are for litter collected around the parish footpaths, open spaces and for small amounts of rubbish put in by passers by and NOT for any domestic waste, people are requested to use their own dustbins for this purpose.

BCA highlighted the following as some of the reasons to develop a plan:-

- 1 Parish Plans are influencing local planning and are being acknowledged by AVDC and Bucks CC in their forward planning. e.g. AVDC use parish plan data in their programme of improving leisure/play facilities in rural areas and Bucks CC include parish plan data in their local transport forward planning.
- 2 Parish plans can provide very good evidence for funding opportunities and approval of local projects such as village hall improvements, facilities and equipment for young people, affordable housing, improved footpaths/bridleways etc.
- 3 The whole community taking ownership of issues affecting the parish and setting the agenda for improving these issues.

It was stressed how important it would be to reach out into the community so that the plan became truly representative of parishioners needs. One of the best ways to do this is to hold public open days where by everyone living, working, owning businesses or simply passing through the parish can call in to give their views on the good things, the needs and issues that concern them. So watch this space as the very first item on the agenda of a newly formed Parish Plan Steering Group will be to set some dates for an open day in each of the three villages. We hope these will take place during Spring/early Summer.





I was there at the foot of the cross. I couldn't understand Why following Him should be banned; I was just a young impressionable youth. I was there at the foot of the cross, I saw his agony, felt the people's loss, I heard Him call to His Father that day, "Forgive them", he said, "They know not what they do or say".... The sky was black just as of night, Lightning, wind, rain, the people took fright. The Temple curtain rent in two. He called,"Father, I am cometh to You". After that, I too, went on my way, But I'll not forget what I saw that day; for this was a man, full of love, I'm told, A carpenter's son, who made so bold as to teach and promise a Spirit from God. I'm filled with wonder, and yes, sometimes fear; for my faith is not strong, Though it is sincere. Today it is to me that He calls. He lifts me when I stumble, or fall. His presence is always at my side, and it's in His love, that I abide.



Village Pubs Past & Present

As a "Newcomer" to Edlesborough, (I only moved here in 1970) I recently got to thinking of how the history of Public Houses is so closely associated with the changing faces of our villages. I pinched the idea of a story written around Public Houses from an article that I read and have applied the idea to the Pubs past and present in the four villages served by Focus. I have also tried to identify their original sites, but I am sure that some of the real locals from the four villages will be able to point out my errors and find for me some more forgotten pubs. I am willing to bet that no one remembers the "Victoria", an alehouse that stood on the site of 8 High Street Edlesborough. The original deeds, once owned by me, showed that it had been two cottages, then an alehouse, then a retail haberdashery, to be followed by Buckrods Hardware, which was demolished and rebuilt, eventually to become Janes Carpets.

I will be very pleased to hear from anybody who can cast any light on more Pubs, their locations, and possibly some of the stories connected to them. Many years ago in the reign of Reg & Marie Catchpole (publicans of the Bell, Edlesborough during the seventies) one regular at the Bell, living at the time in the Old Greyhound when it was a private residence, and others who visited his house, all swore that a man known to many elders of the village, whose name was known to them, (but which escapes me), was to be seen after his death regularly sitting in the lounge of the house in the position where he apparently always sat when alive, and would come and go on a regular basis. True or false? Would anyone who has any news or information regarding any of the items raised in this piece please contact me through the pages of "Focus" thus providing its readers with more information about our villages and their history . 
