On the first Sunday of the New Year I had the pleasure of handing over to representatives of the Chilterns Multiple Sclerosis Society the results of our fundraising on their behalf during 2007, a grand total of $\pounds 6,137$. It is a tremendous achievement, and I want to take the opportunity, on behalf of your Parish Church, of thanking everyone who supported us and helped to make this grand total possible.

When I was a choirboy, one way we used to occupy ourselves during long sermons (apart from playing surreptitious games of 'hangman') was to explore the unfamiliar parts of the Prayer Book. One of the more interesting bits was the "Table to find Easter Day", which meant you could work out when Easter would fall in any year up to 2199! From those childish researches I know that the earliest possible date for Easter is March 23 – it has to be the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox (the first day of spring) - and that is the date of Eater this year. This means that Lent begins very early – Ash Wednesday is 6 February – and Whitsun will be 11 May. This has all sorts of unexpected consequences, e.g. the school Easter holidays set by our two counties will be entirely different, and unless we have some very mild weather it may be difficult to find spring flowers for Mothering Sunday (2 March).

Lent is a time when we are encouraged to reflect on our life-style and see what could be improved. Giving up being grumpy is probably far more significant than giving up sugar in your tea! After all, much of the traditional emphasis of Lent was on our relationships with God and other people, and it is important for all of us to take stock of our significant relationships from time to time to see if there are ways in which we can improve them, and to recognize habits and attitudes which undermine them.

Another important area for review at this time is our own personal "carbon footprint". It is easy to say that the scale of the problem is so vast that nothing I can do will be of any significance, but that simply is not true. The sum of lots of people's tiny contribution can make a real difference, and Lent is a good time for us to think about the way we use our cars and the sort of car we use, our use of power domestically (including all the lights we leave on and appliances which are left on "stand-by"), our travel arrangements, the food we eat and the waste we generate. These all contribute to global warming, and are all relatively simple problems to address. Can Lent 2008 lead us all to a healthier, greener life-style? If so, it can have an immediate advantage for us personally, as well as being part of our response to what is possibly the most important environmental issue of our

day. A more sustainable lifestyle now means a better future for our children and grandchildren.

This all sounds like a "secular Lent", but, of course, I would want to encourage people to make Lent 2008 a time of spiritual growth as well. Perhaps if you have got out of the habit of going to church Lent or Easter this year could be a time of making a return visit. You know you will always be welcome at St Mary's. May God's love and blessings surround you throughout this New Year.

Edlesborough Cricket Club Review of the 2007 Season

A triumphant season for the Colts

Without a shadow of a doubt, the best performances by Edlesborough Cricket Club in 2007 were those of its Colts side. In only their second year competing in the Under 15s East section of the Aylesbury & District Midweek Cricket League, they won their division and then

came back from the dead in an exceptionally exciting final played against the West division winners, Grendon & Westcott, before losing by the narrowest of margins. Ably led by Charlie Dear, the side developed a real team ethos and, coming from a village with very limited junior coaching facilities, can be extremely proud of what was very much a collective achievement. Quite a few of the juniors gained experience in adult matches during the season, and members of the side will hopefully help ensure the future of cricket in Edlesborough in the longer term.

In retrospect, the tenor for the season can be seen to have been set in the first league game against Northchurch, a side against which the Edlesborough have struggled in the past. Bowling first, the ECC Colts dismissed their opponents for only 38 runs, with all six bowlers used taking wickets and not a single wide being bowled (unprecedented in my experience of Colts cricket!), before knocking off the runs easily. Batting first in the following game against Long Marston, they set the formidable 20-over total of 157 for 4, which included a stand of 70 between Declan Hall (51 n.o.) and Charlie Dear (34), that their opponents could not match.

Further efficient wins against Ivinghoe & Pitstone and Wendover set up the key game of the season against an unbeaten, and by all accounts very strong, Cublington side. Batting first, ECC Colts put on the competitive score of 127 for 3, with the foundation being provided by opener James Kight's 56 n.o. In the Cublington innings, Edlesborough took the initiative from the start, dismissing their most dangerous opening batsman first ball and running through the entire side in under 10 overs for only 41 runs, with Sam Slatter taking 5 wickets for 7 runs in just 3 overs with an outstanding piece of bowling. With the pressure reduced in the final league game, Edlesborough lost to a strong Tring Park side, with loose bowling allowing their opponents to score sufficient runs so that even innings of 51 from Declan Hall and 43 from Adam Lee could not turn the game around. In a very tight league, Edlesborough, Cublington and Tring Park all finished with records of won 5 and lost 1, but Edlesborough came top through scoring most bonus points.

After an extremely wet summer in which the league sides had been fortunate to complete all their fixtures, the inter-divisional final on 18 July was played in beautiful weather on an excellent pitch at Dinton, the previous year's winners. With both Edlesborough and Grendon & Westcott having scored a lot of runs during their campaigns, the scene looked set for a high-scoring game. However, Edlesborough won the toss, elected to bat and promptly collapsed, eventually crawling to 46

all out in 16 overs with only Declan Hall reaching double figures. No excuses can be offered – the batsmen just failed to deal with accurate bowling, with 9 out of the 10 wickets falling being bowled. Not surprisingly, Grendon & Westcott at this point clearly considered the game as good as won, but Edlesborough had other ideas. After an initial struggle during which their opponents reached 30 for 2, Edlesborough really turned on the pressure. Tight bowling from Charlie Dear and Tom Howard, who each took 3 wickets for 9 runs, and brilliant catching (5 taken and not one dropped – seniors note!) reduced Grendon & Westcott to 41 for 8 and an improbable victory seemed within grasp. However, it was not to be and Grendon & Westcott scraped home by 2 wickets, having reduced their adult supporters to nervous wrecks! Overall, an extraordinarily exciting, low-scoring game, played in a good competitive spirit and from which both sides could take credit.

A middling season for the Seniors

As seems to be becoming something of a tradition, results for the adult games divided equally between wins (10) and losses (10), with half a dozen draws and an exceptionally exciting tie thrown in for good measure. The Saturday side finished fourth of ten teams in the second division of the Morrant Four Counties Cricket League, winning 5 games, losing 3 and drawing 6, with 4 other games being cancelled or abandoned due to the generally wretched weather. The Sunday friendly side won 5, lost 7 and tied one game. The last-named was away against Bourne End in late July, on a day when Edlesborough was struggling for players and had to bring in 4 from Gaddesden Row, against whom a week previously we had scraped home in a thoroughly enjoyable game that epitomised the best of village cricket. Bourne End batted first on a pudding of a pitch, on which their total of 130 seemed a competitive score. In reply, Edlesborough struggled to score and had still not reached 100 with only 3 of the 40 overs left. However, some massive hitting by Paul Mortimer (39 n.o.) left us needing 3 to win off the final ball – only 2 were scored, but the tie felt like a win in a game we had looked destined to lose.

The player of the season in terms of all round performance was undoubtedly Matthew Merrick, and it was a major loss to Edlesborough that he was available for only 5 league games. He topped both the batting, with an average of 48.4 and a top score of 111 n.o. in the home win against Studham, and the bowling, with an average of 11.5 and the season's best performance of 6 wickets for 13 runs in the home win against Turvey. The only other century of the season was Neil Morgan's 122 in an away friendly against Studham and no other Edlesborough bowler took five wickets in any game. Usually reliable performers struggled to score runs consistently and among the bowlers only Jaco Jacobs, with 33 wickets at an average of 14.8, stood out. Encouragingly, however, some of the Colts performed well in

adult games, with Charlie Dear's 4 for 18 in a league game against a strong Tring Park side and Charlie Oliver's 3 for 9 and 3 for 24 in friendlies against Whitchurch and Gaddesden Row respectively being the pick of the bunch. In closing, the club's thanks are due to Barry Jenkins, who as usual did the scoring in his impeccable fashion at nearly every senior game.

Your Local Weather Station

I have been interested in weather conditions all my life and 5 years ago I installed an electronic weather station, which monitors and records the conditions via radio transmitter to my computer. This information I used solely for my own interest

In September 2007 I upgraded to the next generation professional weather station, which gave me the opportunity to be more accurate with weather forecasting, to monitor in greater detail and add a web link. Identical stations are used by major sporting events and local authorities, such as the Isle of Wight, giving local weather conditions for each of the resorts.Rather than keeping all the information of our local weather to myself I thought that I would share it with the surrounding villages.

Each month I will list the highs and lows and any interesting facts from the previous month.

In the near future I will be launching a live web site giving the current weather conditions and forecasts plus recent history. The information will include the Observations: Rainfall, Temperature, Dew point, Pressure, Humidity, Wind Speed, Wind Direction & Wind chill. They will be in the format of Gauges, Charts and Graphics as well as text.

The plan is to run the web site 24 hours a day automatically updating every 30 mins but this will depend on obtaining some form of funding from sponsored links hopefully from local businesses to support the running costs.

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) has admitted the loss of computer discs containing 25 million child benefit records. The discs were sent in the post but never arrived. They contain names,

addresses, dates of birth, child benefit and national insurance numbers and, in some cases, bank account details of all families claiming child benefit. The government has confirmed that child benefit will continue to be paid. People should check their bank accounts and report any unauthorised transactions to the bank immediately. HMRC has set up a child benefit helpline on 0845 302 1444 for people who want more details. 

I generally find that the ones with the biggest heads are best; mine's about eight feet across and I still keep missing the ball. So 'come on down' as Dale would say: give us a ring and we'll help introduce you to the whole new world of Eaton Bray Tennis Club

By the time you read this, we'll have held our Annual General Meeting - full report next month. However the most exciting proposal before the new committee is our new 'groundshare' scheme with financially-strapped Luton Town. The Hatters have been trying to get out of their current rabbit hutch of a ground since football was invented, and we think we have just the solution, which would solve their immediate money problems whilst bringing additional revenue into our club. By removing the nets from our three new courts, dropping down the interior fence and simply rolling out a strip of artificial turf (using tent pegs to secure it firmly to the ground), our courts could quickly and easily be converted into a temporary football pitch within just a few minutes. Our clubhouse will make an excellent changing facility for the teams and officials, and the 10,000 or so supporters every week could be comfortably housed in four temporary stands around the courts, which one of our builder members reckons he can knock up with a bit of scaffolding and some planks of wood. They'll be on wheels so they can be rolled back and stored in the school gym between matches when we convert back to the tennis courts until the following Saturday. We take half the

weekly admissions and make around 75 grand a week some of which we'll give to every household in the village to help pay for boarding up your windows on a Saturday afternoon.

Just think what an opportunity this is for Eaton Bray's businesses. The Luton supporters will love the peaceful atmosphere of our village, sipping a quite pint whilst enjoying a pub lunch in the White Horse, then maybe a quick haircut before the game, or even a relaxing manicure. After the match as they stroll amiably back along the High Street to their cars (we're recommending the Village Hall car park...) they can pick up some fresh sausages for tea, perhaps a crusty loaf of bread and a lottery ticket, or choose a tasty Chinese to eat on the way home. Everybody wins; Luton Town, us, local shops and businesses - including our builder and any glaziers in the area (especially when Millwall come to play) - this scheme is a sure fire winner and we'll let you know how we get on at the AGM so watch this space!

Finally, we'd like to express our gratitude to the Happy Valley take-away in the High Street for providing us with a superb Fish and Chip supper at our recent quiz night at our clubhouse. It was worth going along for the food alone. Based on my general knowledge skills, next time I'll skip the first four rounds and just turn up for the supper, no one will notice!

Highlights of Minutes of the Eaton Bray Parish Council Meeting Held on 7th January at 7.30 p.m.

Public Open Forum

Mr Brian Webb gave an update on the situation regarding the planning application at Dyers Road.

Mr Woolridge asked for an update on the situation at Mill End.

Cllr Beal stated that he and Cllr Pearson had carried out a site visit and had noted the piles of wood, it was still undecided whether this area would require a security fence or be developed as a public amenity (see item 9) Mr Woolridge stated that in his opinion the state of the ground surface made this area unsuitable as a public space.

Cllr Marriage reported that the village handyman had been instructed to repair the fence to the left of the bridge.

Cllr Beal reported that the legal representative of the owner of the adjacent land had instructed the council to obtain estimates for the work which needs to be done. Cllr Beal stated that

- the pruning of the hedge in Middle Path was in the April 2008 precept and work would be authorised after this date.
- the GP meeting had consulted the Byelaws and horse riding was not permitted on the greens around Mill End Close. The Byelaws would be displayed in the village notice board in that area.
- there was no objection to the erection of a gate providing certain conditions were met see GP minutes.

Cllr Brand stated that there is no record of who owns the piece of land located between the Deeres and the Worrels the land registry have been contacted but were unable to offer any help.

Mr Woolridge asked if the Ransom strip was council owned logically would not the three access points (in the original plans to give a right of way to resident to enable them to reach the back fence) between the houses also be council owned? District Cllr Janes stated that SB's will have a site plan of the estate from when planning permission was given. He would obtain a copy and pass to Cllr Beal.

Cllr Brand reported that some residents were unhappy about the hedges being trimmed and were stopping access

- Bedfordshire is still waiting for a ministerial decision regarding the proposed administrative changes to the County







New Montessori Opens in Centenary Year

Edlesborough Book Group Review The Grave Tattoo by Val McDermid

The discovery in the Lake District of a mummified body, tattooed in the style of the South Seas, sets Wordsworth scholar, Jane Gresham on the journey which forms the story of The Grave Tattoo. The body of the Bounty mutineer, Fletcher Christian, has never been discovered on Pitcairn Island and, as he and William Wordsworth were once schoolmates at Cockermouth, Jane feels that this could prove her long held belief that Christian returned to the Lake District and was sheltered by his friend. She has a theory that Wordsworth set down Fletcher Christian's story and that there is somewhere an undiscovered manuscript which has been hidden by Wordsworth's descendants. This could be worth a fortune, and her efforts to find the document and validate her theory, sets off a series of events in London and the Lake District, culminating in a series of murders.

The group read The Grave Tattoo as complete newcomers to the works of Val McDermid and her highly praised reviews led us to expect great things. The book was very easy to read, but we thought that the characters lacked depth. We also commented on the amount of minor characters which did not seem necessary and this made for too many sub plots to bring together for a satisfactory conclusion. This, we felt spoilt the book and made it rather difficult to believe.

St Mary's Parochial Church Council Meeting

A Happy New Year to you all from everyone at St.Mary's. The proposal to create the position of Parish Administrator is still ongoing.

Over £6,000 has been raised by St Mary's for its charity of the year 2007. A cheque was presented to representatives of the Chilterns Multiple Sclerosis Society on Sunday 6th January at the 10 a.m service.

Friends of St. Mary's coffee morning in the church will resume in April. There will be a Fair Trade Breakfast in March. The Parish Lunch held on the third Sunday each month continues to be a great success but more help is required.

A discussion about a service directed at children was lengthy. A volunteer from the congregation, Sunday School Teacher's and representatives from the PCC are to meet to put some proposals together. The children's services at Christmas were well supported and enjoyed, thanks to Gordon Gray who seems to connect with the children so well.

Budget proposals for 2008 were presented by our Treasurer and accepted by the PCC.
