Edlesborough Book Group Review A Portrait in Sepia by Isabel Allende

This is a sweeping family saga, covering three generations of a family living in San Francisco and Chile in the latter half of the nineteenth century. Its heroine, Aurora del Valle, is conceived out of wedlock. Her mother, who is half Chinese, dies in childbirth and her father, the son of a wealthy Chilean business family, is indifferent to her birth. Her maternal grandparents take sole charge of her and her first five years are secure and happy in the Chinatown district of San Francisco. When her beloved grandfather dies suddenly, she is given into the care of her other grandmother, the flamboyant and extremely rich, Paulina del Ville. Their relationship becomes very close and Aurora leads a much more privileged life. Paulina realises that because of her granddaughter's mixed blood, there are inherent problems for her when she grows up and so decides to leave San Francisco and return to Chile, where she originated and where her family still live.

Aurora is told nothing of her origins and her true identity and that of her father, remain a mystery. Her story involves her self discovery, her love of photography, which lead her to independence and her eventual acceptance of her ancestry.

The plot is dense covering many issues regarding South America, its wars, revolutions and history. It comments on racial issues and the social divides operating in America in the late nineteenth century. Long passages of lyrical prose and many characters, some of which come from previous novels, make it very much a book to either love or hate. Two members of our group loved it.

Passers-by will have noticed that the east end of our parish church is once more encased in scaffolding, as we begin the costly work of repairing the chancel roof and replacing the lead which has kept wind and rain out for the last century or so. This is the third phase of the renewal of the whole roof: the nave roof was done two years ago and the south aisle the year before that. The first two phases cost around £100,000 – all money raised by the local church over the years.

As we were planning this new phase last year, we had hoped that we would have enough money available to complete the whole task. But since then two things have overtaken us – the rapid rise in the cost of metals, and the consequent spate of thefts of lead from church roofs. It is the second factor which has made it impossible for us to repair more than the chancel roof at present. Because of the number of claims for lead theft, as soon as scaffolding is erected the insurance on all materials, including all the lead already on the roofs, is suspended. In consequence, we must pay security guards to protect the building when the contractors are not on site for the entire duration of the contract, which will increase the cost by £30-40,000. What we had hoped would pay to re-roof the north aisle will instead be spent on "one man and his dog". The present work will cost us almost £90,000, at the end of which all the money we have been building up carefully over the years will have been expended. And we shall still be left with a fourth phase, the north aisle, to be done at some future date.

It will not surprise you, therefore, to know that there will be plenty of fund-raising activities organized to raise money for the church repairs, and we would beg everyone who values the existence of their village church to support our efforts as generously as possible. An analysis of last year's accounts shows that it costs £301 a day to keep the church running – but that figure does not make any provision for major repairs, restorations or improvements. Every penny of that money has to be raised by the direct giving and efforts of parishioners – contrary to popular rumour there is no outside money subsidizing the local church – and major projects require special events to fund them. We have an important historic church at the heart of our village, and we have no hesitation in asking people in the villages to help us make sure that it is still here for future generations. Please help us.

I make no apology for raising another matter for which I urge your generous support. With this magazine you will receive an envelope for this year's Christian Aid Week appeal, and someone from the churches in our community will call on you during the week 11-17 May to collect your gift. All this money goes directly to help victims of natural disasters – floods, earthquake, famine, drought – and man-made disasters, and to improve farming techniques and create small local industries for the poorest people on earth. A small gift can transform another person's prospects for the future, and

money given to Christian Aid will be well used. So, please be generous, and if you are a tax-payer, please fill out the Gift Aid declaration on the envelope to increase the value of your gift by 28%.

Thank you for all the support you can give to Christian Aid and to your local parish church.


Biting the Bullet By Leighton Buzzard Drama Group 26 – 28 June 2008

Theatre Review - Old Time Music Hall

A very special event took place on 28th March at Eaton Bray village hall. Eighteen young people aged from 10-18 presented a full-scale traditional Old Time Music Hall to a sold-out audience to raise money for the Friends of St Mary's.

There was a buzz of expectation as a packed hall greeted the appearance on stage of James Lake who introduced the evening in the guise of the traditional music hall Chairman. Dressed in top hat and tails he introduced each act with witty quips, jokes, alliteration and a bang of the gavel (who remembers Leonard Sachs on The Good Old Days?!). He introduced the 'orchestra' for the evening - Ros Yalden on the piano – with traditional jibes about the quality of her playing but it was all in good humour and she accompanied the performers beautifully all evening.

The opening choruses were sung by the entire company and we could tell straight away that we were in for a good evening as the cast danced and sang with great strength and quality – they were all clearly enjoying the experience. They all looked authentic, with period costumes and props supplied by Wendy Ashman, whose husband, Peter, directed the show and provided much of the script.

The workload for the evening was fairly shared across the entire company with each performer having at least one solo performance in each of the two acts – that was a wise decision as everyone in the cast was clearly a highly competent performer – there were no weak links.

The first half consisted of fourteen separate acts starting with one of the all time greats – Daisy Bell – beautifully sung by Sophie Yalden. Other highlights in Act One included: a cheeky performance of a little known song called What's that For Eh? by Alice O'Neill who had the audience in the palm of her hand; a hilarious comic rendition of the poem The Green Eye of the Yellow God by Heather Mullett whose arm movements were provided by Emily Ann Varley; the Stanley Holloway monologue Runcorn Ferry by Sebastian Calloway (how did he learn all those lines?); Don't Dilly Dally and Daddy Wouldn't Buy Me a Bow Wow sung by the highly talented Heather and Holly Potten; Cockles and Mussels sung with great conviction by Alex Mustoe; a touching performance of Won't You Buy My Pretty Flowers by Molly Blumsom: and a melodrama which had Freddie Marshall being henpecked by a convincing Melissa Wade before getting his revenge by selling her to the local squire wonderfully played by a joke-cracking William Sanders (who went on to give us a classical guitar solo in Act Two).

After such a slick and fast-paced first Act, the audience were ready for their lovely ploughman's supper provided by Val Trantum and her vastly capable team.

In Act Two the audience were treated to delights such as I Was A Good Little Girl sung by Olivia Calloway who made several gentlemen's nights by flirting with them from the stage whilst her talented sister Sabrina Calloway attracted whistles from the audience as a scantily clad artist's model in It's Alright in the Summertime. Emily Lake gave a beautiful rendition of the little-heard Shine On Harvest Moon and the half climaxed with a performance of the melodrama The Old Red Barn which had strong comic acting from Erin O'Neill as the wronged Maria Martin and Joe Ashman as the wicked William Corder who ends up killing her – but not before he milked the boos and hisses from the audience.

The evening concluded with the Chairman inviting the audience to join in the final choruses in traditional style ("chiefly yourselves") and the entire cast sung and danced such numbers as Any Old Iron and Beside the Seaside with great energy, enthusiasm and quality.

The audience went home happy after two and a half hours – nearly a thousand pounds was raised for Friends of St Mary's and they had been entertained by a group of highly-talented young people. There were no 'stars' in this show – every performer was exceptionally strong – they looked good, were well-rehearsed and clearly enjoyed entertaining their audience. When are we going to get an encore?!

Lasting Powers Of Attorney

Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPA) were introduced on 1st October 2007 and are powerful legal documents. Rather like a Will records who is to act as Executor(s) at the time of a death, the two LPAs separately record who (Attorney(s)) is to manage the property and financial affairs and make decisions about the personal welfare of the Donor.

A Personal Welfare LPA is only operative after the Donor's loss of mental capacity. Loss of mental capacity is determined by a medical practitioner and can result from an accident or illness, and can be temporary or permanent.

A **Property and Affairs LPA** is also often made dependent on a Donor's loss of mental capacity, but need not be so. For example, a person may still be capable of making decisions but restricted mobility makes it more practical for an authorised person to implement the decisions and any related tasks.

Accidents and illness can strike at anytime so LPAs are not just for the elderly. For both types of LPAs more than one Attorney can be appointed. They can act together and or independently, and the authority granted can be open or restricted. The authority granted by the Donor to one Attorney does not have to be the same as that granted to another. It is not necessary to have both types of LPA, but it is probably sensible to do so.

When a person looses their mental capacity and there is no LPA available a member(s) of the family or a friend(s) will need to apply to the Court of Protection to obtain the authority to make decisions on their behalf, whether in respect of financial matters and or personal welfare. This is not straightforward and is an expensive and lengthy process.

In a similar way to having an up to date Will available, having LPAs available when they are needed relieves loved ones of a great deal of expense and time wasting. By recording the person(s) who is to act on behalf of the Donor when they are unable to do so, certainty prevails and family differences are avoided at a very emotional and stressful time. Appropriate decisions and actions can be taken immediately.

Once a LPA is registered with the Court of Protection, the nominated Attorney(s) can act according to the powers granted to them. At all times an Attorney must act in the best interests of the Donor. The Court of Protection oversees that this is so.

LPAs are far more complex than the Enduring Power of Attorney which the LPA Property and Affairs replaced. It is recommended that expert guidance is obtained

on all the options available, ideally in the privacy of your home, and that the LPA(s) are prepared by Law Society regulated solicitors. Sovereign Will & Probate Services Ltd provide this service, as well as Wills and Probate, locally for a very competitive fee.





Concerns were raised regarding the state of the Parish roads and the Parish Council confirmed they are aware of the problems and are bringing issues raised to the attention of Bedfordshire Highways. Also issues were raised concerning airport expansion/new flight paths with the Parish Council confirming they are looking into this. Concerns were raised regarding dog fowling in the Parish, the Parish Council agreeing to look into the purchasing of additional Dog Hygiene Bins (i.e. for Holmans Field, Market Square, The Meads), but also wishing to highlight to dog owners that it is "an offence not to clear up after your dog".



Dagnall Weather Station (AONB)


March has been a wet month. Although I recorded 24 days rain, there were only 8 days of any significant rain. The weather centre equipment is so precise that it measures rain in 0.2 mm (1/125 ins.), an extremely small amount such as very fine drizzle or a few minutes of light rain.

We have heard the weather forecasters this month talk about 'wind chill', particularly during Easter. Normally our dominant wind comes from the SW when there are little differences between the measured temperature and wind chill, but at Easter for a few days it was coming from the NNE, direct from the Artic.

The plot below shows the effect of the wind on the temperature: on Easter Saturday 22nd at 7.00am the wind was 25-mph coming from the NNE the temperature was 1.7° c, but it felt like -2.3°c; a difference of 4°c - no-wonder it felt so cold! It would be a lot better if Easter were at the same time each year in mid-April, hopefully a bit warmer.

Mothers' Union - Eaton Bray with Edlesborough

At the March meeting members learned the arts of digital photography – well some of them anyway. The speaker was Eileen Bennett, who trained as a medical photographer at the Royal Society of Medicine, subsequently working in hospitals photographing operations, wounds, limbs etc.

Whilst still retaining an 'original' camera, Eileen has been using digital since 2003 and showed her work not only in photographs, but also posters, newsletters, etc.

Digital photography can be cheaper than using film, and perhaps most importantly for our members, ownership of a computer is not necessary. Photos can be printed at many commercial outlets at competitive prices and of course, no film is being used and therefore there is no film to 'run out'. Digital cameras have a card which will take 2/300 exposures and if all these have been printed or copied to a disk, the card can be wiped clean and re-used. On most cameras it is also possible to improve the quality of the photographs by reducing the quantity of photos which the card shows as being the maximum number. Eileen showed examples of the benefit of this technique; cropping photos in which a particular area is enlarged; removing 'red-eye', etc.

Prices for digital cameras can start as low as £50, and after that the 'sky is the limit.' **April**

We had a very interesting talk by Patricia Yates, who is a world wide traveller. Her talk was about Tehran. When she arrived she was already prepared for the strange dress they have to wear. You must not show your ankles, so a long button through dress is a must, worn with high boots, also you must cover your head. to the world news. The students are very young and many go to university but they are very limited in what they can study. There are separate taxis for ladies and gents and separate rooms when they have wedding parties. They sell very fresh vegetables on the market, but the meat, although fresh, is usually covered in flies! According to Patricia the people love to meet in the parks on Sundays to read poetry.

It was a very pleasant afternoon, we finished off with tea and cakes followed by Grace.

MY FEET HURT!!



Sore painful feet are an absolute curse. It is not an easy part to rest unless of course you can walk around on your hands! It's only when our feet hurt that we realise how much we are upon them in a day.

Metatarsalgia – Literally means pain in the metatarsals – these are the toes and long bones of your forefoot. The pain can often develop for no obvious reason or incident. The pain usually occurs after long periods of weight bearing, running, walking or standing and is often very intense and burning. It will then often ease when you sit down and take the weight off your feet.

If you are suffering from painful feet here are some tips you may find useful:

- Look at your footwear have your shoes collapsed at the sides, therefore reducing the support to your arches?
- Do you wear heels most of the day? If so, why not try wearing lower heels and even go barefoot in the evenings.
- Exercise your feet by doing both stretching and strengthening exercises. Make sure you stretch your calf muscles too as a tight calf muscle can influence the performance of your feet and lower leg. If you are unaware of how to do this we will be pleased to advise you.
- Try gently massaging the tender tissues.
- Apply ice to the area if hot and swollen.

If the pain does not settle using these tips then seek the advice of your local physiotherapist. Treatment can be done to ease the pain and swelling and teach exercises to off-load painful structures. The physiotherapist may also conclude that it is also necessary for you to see a podiatrist for assessment of how to further correct the mechanics of your foot. This is done by way of prescribing an orthotic, a device that can go into your shoe to help your foot and lower leg alignment. Both our physiotherapy and podiatry service have been extended to include Saturdays for added convenience now.

Edlesborough W.I.

As well as holding our usual monthly meeting in March, we hosted the Beacon Group meeting later in the month.

At our monthly meeting a letter from the Parish Council was read out, thanking us for the donation towards the new cemetery access. We were given some information regarding the new free bus passes, and also details of the EDAN plan.

Our speaker, Mr Stephen Hoole from the Royal Nurmismatic Society, gave a very interesting account of the history of coinage. Originally coins were produced in mints situated countrywide, and pennies were made of silver. However, when extra money was needed during the Industrial Revolution of 1790, not enough silver was available.

Copper began to be used instead, and was much cheaper. Many coins were made of Welsh copper, and commercial coins came into use. Companies issued their own coins, and many shops gave their own in change. This was a clever move, because they could be used only in the shops concerned. Some coins were political, and others were issued on behalf of certain industries such as whale fishery, bakery and cottage industries. In fact, it was a form of advertising.

Stage coaches began to use money tokens which were converted back into money at the end of the journey. This was in case of a hold-up and, in fact, was the first form of travellers' cheques. Ships crews were paid with ships' own money, which had to be used within a distance of three miles from the ship. This prevented desertion. Many cities had their own coins, and these showed places of interest such as York Minster and Newgate Prison.

Mr. Hoole illustrated his talk with slides of historical coins. It was interesting to see how many different ones had come to be used over the years. Some members had brought along old coins of their own, and were given the history of them.

Our Group Meeting was another enjoyable meeting. It is always interesting to hear annual reports from other W.I.'s, and to get together with members of the Beacon Group.

Mrs Jackie Ayre from Totternhoe demonstrated some beautiful flower arranging. She used a varied amount of foliage along with the flowers, and produced some lovely displays. As well as demostrating, Jackie gave very useful tips on the care of the plants she used. This applied particularly to the foliage, as most of this came from her own garden. All the arrangements went into the raffle, making very special prizes to be won that evening.

To end the meeting we all enjoyed tea and tasty homemade cakes in the usual W.I. tradition!!
