### EDaN Project Update



By the time your read this message households in Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall (EDaN) will have started to receive a copy of the Edlesborough Parish Plan through the letterbox. If you have not received one by mid-August there are contact details at the end of this article.

Please read it thoroughly as it identifies the key projects that will be undertaken by the Project Action Teams over the next several years. Each project has a list of recommendations that each team will consider and develop actions to fulfil these where appropriate.

Please keep your copy of the plan in a safe place so that you can refer to it whenever an issue arises that you are concerned about. Check the plan to see if it is covered. From time to time the EDaN Steering Group will review the relevance of the plan and update it as appropriate. For those of you with Internet access the Plan and actions will appear on the Parish website www.edlesborough.gov.uk under Parish Plan (EDaN Project). Some of the Project Action Teams are already active.

### **Retain Edlesborough Post Office**

The 'Retain Edlesborough Post Office Team' is pleased to confirm that Edlesborough Post Office is on the list to REMAIN OPEN and part of the PO network subject to the 6 week consultation period ending on 26th August 2008. The decision is not final until this period is over. We wish to thank everyone who signed the petition to keep it open but also **ask everyone to continue to use Edlesborough PO as much as possible**.

You can still help ensure the future of our Post Office by writing to Laura Tarling, Network Development Manager, C/O National Consultation Team, FREEPOST CONSULTATION TEAM or email to consultation@postoffice.co.uk stating how pleased you are it is proposed to remain open and that you would welcome any additional services such as Road Fund Licences and the Passport Checking Service.

### **Beautify the Villages**

This team too has made good progress already and is putting some definition to their recommendations to ensure that their proposals are practical and meet with the various regulations that exist these days. Cost evaluations need to take place too and these are being pursued.

### **Footpaths and Pavements**

This team is up and running evaluating the data from the questionnaires together with the comments that many of you made in order to draw out common themes for prioritisation. The process that this team. as every other team, will go through is to take the recommendations, put clear actions against them and identify the resources and costs involved together with a time frame.

The Project Action Team plans will also appear on the Parish website for all to see.

Much of what Jesus taught us was done through parables – stories which are easy to remember and which challenge us to think about life. Instructions apply only to specific situations, and as circumstances change they often become irrelevant; stories illuminate all sorts of new situations.

Here's an interesting modern parable I came across not very long ago. A teacher gave each child in a class a large glass jar (it must have been a long time ago, or Health and Safety would have forbidden it!) and a collection of pebbles, gravel chips and sand, and asked them to get as much as they could into their jar. Those who filled the jar with sand first of all discovered they couldn't get anything else in. Those who tried the gravel found they could get a little bit of sand in if they poured it very carefully, but nothing else. Those who started off with the pebbles found they could get quite a lot of gravel chips into the spaces between the pebbles, and then quite a lot of sand into the remaining spaces.

Then came the message. "Now", teacher said, "I want you to think of the jar as your life. The rocks are the really important things like faith and care for others, and love and honesty and goodness. The gravel chips are the ordinary things of everyday life – work and domestic chores and learning and all the things like that. The sand is our pleasures and all the things we indulge ourselves with. What does the jar teach us? If we try to fill our lives with pleasures and self-indulgence, there is very soon no room for anything else. If our concerns are almost exclusively for work and home duties then we'll find a bit of room to enjoy ourselves, but not much. If we start with the rocks of faith and love and care for others and all the other really important things, then we'll find there's plenty of room in our lives for work and duties and for enjoying ourselves as well." And that is probably just about the reverse of how many people see things, isn't it?

How do you fill up your life? Think about it as you lie on the beach or sit in your garden this summer, and see what this simple little story is saying to you.





### Signals: A Railway Miscellany The Book Castle, Dunstable, £9.99 ISBN: 978 1 903747 90 2 Available from September in all good bookshops

Since the dawn of the railway age, a fascinating mixture of lines have crisscrossed the counties of Hertfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire. They range from narrow gauge examples, such as the Leighton Buzzard

Narrow Gauge Railway and Whipsnade Zoo's "Jumbo Express", constructed for both commercial and tourism purposes, to main trunk routes. Such lines commence at London's Kings Cross, Euston and St Pancras stations, and first came to public attention during the glorious era of steam and which remain as steadfast today, solid planks within the modern railway network. This book also features some that have survived closure scares, and which remain in use. The most well known lines of this type are the "Abbey Flyer" route between Watford Junction and St Albans Abbey, and that between Bedford and Bletchley. There are others that have fallen before the march of the internal combustion engine, but which live on as public footpaths, accessible to all, prominent amongst these being the former lines between Wolverton and Newport Pagnell, and Watford to Rickmansworth. A number of heritage railway centres and museums are also described, each with their own special characteristics, for example the long lived Buckinghamshire Railway Centre. The story is also told of one of the longest-lived national organisations catering for the "gricer", this being the Locomotive Club of Great Britain. A fascinating selection of photographs add a further dimension to this treasure-trove of the railway world, past and present.

### Wheels to Work arrives in South Bedfordshire!

Help is at hand for those in South Bedfordshire struggling to access education, training or employment, thanks to an exciting new Bedfordshire Rural Transport Partnership scheme being delivered by BRCC.

Wheels to Work, which is funded principally by Bedfordshire County Council with additional funding from the Learning and Skills Council, provides an innovative way of overcoming transport barriers to key services, offering transport solutions to individuals for a six to nine month period until a longer-term solution can be found.

This is generally though moped loan, for which a nominal sum is charged per month, part of which is invested in a savings programme so that a moped can be purchased at the end of the loan period. Those who do not qualify for a moped loan will be offered assistance with personalised travel planning.

The scheme is one of around 55 across the country and will be eligible to people:

- Of working age (16 64) with priority given to those aged 16 24
- Living in the South Bedfordshire area (excluding Luton)
- Having limited or no access to transport for employment, education or training opportunities.

### A History of Dagnall Village - An Extract

A map of 1857 shows most of the houses spread along the Leighton Buzzard road, then known as Hempstead Road and Hempstead Lane. The majority of the remainder being adjacent to Chapel Dell Pond and along Studham Lane. These cottages were collectively known as Pound Bank Cottages. A few other cottages were further up the lane at the Quaker Burial Ground.

The census of 1881 shows a total population of 484 living in 95 houses, the majority along Hempstead Road and Hempstead Lane (by now called Edlesborough Road). Along here was the Church and School, the Methodist Chapel, the Parsonage, the Shops, Wheelwrights, Blacksmiths etc, the Public Houses and the Brewery. Also the larger farmsteads and the homes of the Batchelor brothers (the owners of the Brewery) and the schoolmaster.

Most of the rest of the villagers lived in Pound Bank Cottages, there were 32 cottages in this area, together with the 172 acre Lower Farm and the Bell Public House, (Bethshan). 156 people lived in these cottages, the men were the agricultural labourers and their wives and no doubt, most of their children were straw plaiters.

Straw hat making was a flourishing trade in Luton and Dunstable in the 19th Century. Even before the end of the 18th century, Dunstable had given its name to straw hats made in the district. The cottage industry of straw plaiting dominated home life and was said to be ideal employment for wives and children of the agricultural labourers. It could be done indoors, outdoors or sitting in the doorway, in groups or alone.

Although mainly a female occupation most boys were taught plaiting and attended the plaiting school until they were old enough to take up farm work. A typical plait school was held in a small cottage room, attendance costing the parents in the 1850's about two pence a week. Children's earnings ranged from about ninepence a week by the time they were eight years old to 2/6d - 3/- at fourteen. This at a time when an agricultural labourers pay was about ten shillings a week.

The plaiters could either sell their plait to travelling dealers such as CHARLES ASTLING or at a higher price by taking it to the plait markets held at Dunstable on Wednesdays, or Tring or Ivinghoe on Fridays. For a time the Dagnall Plait School was held at Dagnall Hall Farm which was formed by David Gadsden. In the late 1840's and early 50's the plaiting mistress was his daughter Mary Anne Gadsden who also taught reading and writing. (In March 1851 at the age of 20 she married John Hawkins and went to live with him at Pitstone Green Farm.) Writing in 1861 in history and Topography of Beds, Jane Sheaham referring to Dagnall says "a portion of a farm house is used as a school in which Divine Service is likewise performed every Sunday." And in 1864 Kellys Directory referring to the elementary school opened by Lord Brownlow the previous year says "a night school is also held twice a week for men and once a week for women, reading, writing, arithmetic and plaiting are taught."

Straw plaiting remained the principle employment of the female inhabitants of Dagnall until the 1890s when the trade went into a steady decline as a result of cheaper imports from China and Japan.

Early in the century the Earl of Bridgewater was Lord of the Manor followed by the

Countess of Bridgewater and Arthur Macnamara as Lady and Lord of the Manor and then Viscount Alford. In the second half of the century it was the 2nd and 3rd Earl Brownlows.

In 1851 the Ashridge Clothing Club was established by Lady M Alford, "The object of the club is to encourage and spread economy among the labouring classes". It was for the benefit of the villages of Little Gaddesden, Ringshall, Hudnall, Dagnall, Nettleden and Frithsden. In addition to the members subscriptions an additional sum called the bonus was added at the end of each year.

A Bedding Club was also in being, the object of which was to supply iron bedsteads and mattresses at a very reasonable price.

Another club which was started around 1876 was to "assist the labouring classes to get medical attendance at a small cost".

The rules of the Club were:

Single person above 13 years of age8dMan and wife10

For a man, wife and children under 13

8d a month 10d a month

1 shilling a month.

In 1848 a Wesleyan Chapel was opened and later in 1863 a Church Day School and Church Mission Room, which had been erected by Lord Brownlow, was opened.

Formal elementary education was now available in the village for the first time. The prime object of the plait school mistresses was to ensure the day's quota of plait was completed, any other form of education was minimal or non existent. Although Mary Gadsden also taught reading and writing this was comparatively rare, most plait school mistresses of the day were almost, if not quite, illiterate.

It is understandable perhaps that many of the parents in the village were not over anxious to send their children to the new school, particularly as they had to pay and unlike the plait school, there was no immediate financial return. Even 12 years or more later the children were regularly kept from school if there was any work available for them, as these typical extracts from the school log show:

- 16.8.75 Average attendance considerably lower this week. Many of the children out in the fields gathering acorns.
- 23.2.77 The average attendance is low, the reason is many of the children are employed at home in sewing the plait up into hats and bonnets.
- 14.9.77 The average attendance the past week is very low owing to many of the children being absent gleaning in the fields.

The Factory Act of 1867 banned the employment of children under eight and the Education Act of 1876 brought in compulsory education for children above five and under ten. Children between ten and twelve could only be employed if they had reached a minimum standard of education.

Although in the 1880's elementary education had become compulsory it still had to be paid for and the school records continued to show a high rate of absenteeism.

In 1891 schooling was made free and after that the situation gradually improved. The school log in October 1897 shows: No. on Books - 68, percentage of attendance - 91%.

It has been difficult to look after these properly in recent years so discussions are taking place with the Eaton Bray Parish Council which is responsible for the maintenance of the rest of the churchyard. It is hoped the Council will be able to take over the care of them.

#### Harvest arrangements for 2008

There will be a Harvest Supper and barn dance with caller and live music on Saturday

20th September 7.00-10.30pm; supper will be provided by the church's social committee.

On Sunday 21st September, a Harvest Thanksgiving service will take place in St. Mary's. Everyone is warmly invited to attend this special service. There will be an auction of produce after the service and the proceeds will be sent to the Bishop of St Alban's Harvest Appeal which this year will be given to one of Christian Aid's partner organisations in Mali, West Africa, the third poorest country in the world. The money will be used to train local fishermen in farming techniques as global warming and falling water levels in the River Niger have made it difficult to earn a living through fishing.

Other Harvest Services in the Parish will take place on Sunday 28th September at 6pm in All Saints' Church, Dagnall and Sunday 1st October in St Mary's Church, Edlesborough at 6pm.

#### Weekday Services

Regular attendees will be pleased to know that the 7.30am service on Tuesday and 9.30am service on Wednesday, which were not possible during the recent restoration work of St Mary's, will, now that has been completed, be resumed as from the first Tuesday in August.

#### Worship for Everyone

This service which takes place on the second Sunday of the month at 10.00am, has attempted recently to offer a wider range of different styles of worship. There has been an excellent response to these services from the congregation. The next Worship for Everyone will take place on 10th August and Rebecca Baldock will be present. Many people will remember that St Mary's congregation supported Rebecca in her work at the hospital at Kangango, Uganda in 2006/2007 when this was our Charity of the Year.

#### Away Day

The PCC has arranged an 'Away Day' to give committee members a welcome chance to discuss pastoral matters. This will take place on 11th October and the subject, arising out of a recent questionnaire of church members, will be 'What kind of church are we? What kind of church do we want to be?

#### Carnival 2008

The success of Carnival 2008 was discussed and sincere thanks given to Peter Bennett and the Carnival Committee for having made it happen. The Carnival has added much to our villages and is a wonderful opportunity for the residents of the four villages to come together and have fun.

#### **Bell-ringers**

On some Sundays, it has not been possible to ring the full peel of bells at St Mary's as bell-ringers are in short supply at present. Committee members were encouraged to try to find recruits to learn the art of bell ringing. On Sundays when the bell cannot be rung, the service bell will be sounded for 5 minutes to indicate that a worshipping congregation is there and the service is about to begin.

### Mothers Union Report Eaton Bray with Edlesborough

At the June meeting, members had the privilege of listening to Lt. Col. Brian Knightley and his wife Dorothy who both spoke about their experiences during a thirteen year period of living in Liberia as Salvation Army missionaries.

Liberia is in West Africa, with a population of 3 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> million people who are mainly the descendants of slaves who were returned to the country from America after the abolition of slavery. The capital city, Monrovia, is named after the American President who arranged for their return, which accounts for the 'Americanisation' of the people with attitudes, spelling, etc.

When they arrived in 1991, the country was in the grip of a civil war – they arrived in a siege; lived through many difficult times; and more troubles flared up as they left. At one stage American troops had offered them an escape route which they refused, but in 2004 they were attacked, but managed to escape and returned to England.

Starting with open air services, six permanent churches were eventually built. Although the buildings might start as bamboo structures, it was important to erect permanent buildings to ensure the people realised that the Salvation Army was to be there permanently as well.

School buildings followed, two of which were built with funds from Norway where the S.A. raised 20% of the cost and the Norwegian Government 80%. Brian used 'manpower' rather than machinery, thus giving people employment and self respect. Many Liberians became Salvationists and took the teaching, both religious and practical, back to the villages.

Boy soldiers, victims of the civil war, became the 'Hostel Boys' living in hostels, but subsequently visiting police stations and prisons to help other males in difficulties – and, of course – a brass band was created. Girls have little education in Liberia,

which caused the start of the Girls Hostels and the Home League group for women who were taught dressmaking, home craft skills, drama etc.

Wells were dug; medical assistance organised, with regular fortnightly visits to outlying areas where food, particularly milk products from Switzerland were distributed to the malnourished children and babies and by 1996 a feeding programme was introduced. They still have contracts in Liberia and know that the work and programmes they introduced still continue.

'Til sleep arrives, to stem the tide that carries us along." Have a lovely summer.





### Soldiers. Sailors and Airmen's Families Association

In recent months there has been plenty of coverage in the news media of the plight of the armed services in action in Iraq and Afghanistan, of the returning wounded and of bereaved families. There have also been references to the lack of recognition given to our forces on their return from active service. All who have connections with service life were shocked by the hostility recently shown to men and women in uniform by some people on the grounds that they were against the wars.

Current military conflicts are unlike the major world wars of the twentieth century, which threatened the very survival of the nation. They were fought by vast numbers of conscripts alongside the professionals, and the whole population was behind them.

We now have volunteer forces, fighting in remote geographical locations for causes which can divide rather than unite the nation.

Today's servicemen and women have joined up in the full knowledge that they were likely to face military action. In taking part they are doing their duty. It is unthinkable that they and their families should not be given the support they need and deserve in coping with the adverse outcomes of their service life.

There is another side to the story. Publicity for the many tragic outcomes of the wars has led to some enhancement of government support for disabled victims but also to a vigorous response by the voluntary sector. On the 7th May The City of London organised a Salute outside St Paul's Cathedral to honour all branches of the services. Donations from the event were presented to the long-established Soldiers. Sailors and Airmen's Families Association, (SSAFA Forces Help,) founded in 1885, and also to a very new charity, "Help for Heroes".

SSAFA has a major national role in the provision of facilities for the treatment and rehabilitation of severely wounded men and women. Accommodation is also available for the long term care of elderly ex-servicemen. and for brief periods of respite for people facing particularly stressful situations at home.

These national initiatives are complemented by local networks of volunteer caseworkers who are trained to respond to the wide range of practical, financial and emotional problems that commonly arise within the ex-service community. In Buckinghamshire there are about 40 caseworkers who currently handle about 300 cases a year.

We would welcome more volunteers and more clients. National estimates suggest that the military charities reach a disappointingly small proportion of the ex-service people and their dependants who would qualify for support.

If any readers, through either professional or social contacts, become aware of an ex-service family who might qualify for help they are invited to bring SSAFA to their attention and suggest that they telephone the contact number below. 



### **Incapacity Benefit - Checks for Fraud and Error**

From May, Jobcentre Plus will be reviewing claims of incapacity benefit for possible fraud and errors. Full case checks will be carried out on about 1,000 claimants from across the UK during this financial year. Cases are

randomly selected and a two-part check will be undertaken. The first part is to identify if there is any official error in the case, and will take place in the office. The second part is a home visit to review the claimant's circumstances and to identify any fraud or customer mistake. Claimants identified as vulnerable will be notified of the visit. Other claimants will not receive any prior notification.

Claims for jobseeker's allowance, income support, pension credit and state retirement pension are already checked for fraud and error.



Ram Mohammad Thomas, a poor, orphan youth from Mumbai enters an Indian television Quiz show and wins one billion rupees. Ram is arrested by the authorities as the television company thought that he must have cheated or had been aided by somebody in the audience. They felt that nobody from his background could possibly have known the answers to all thirteen questions. Awaiting torture in a prison cell, Ram is about to sign a false confession when a young lawyer bails him and takes him home. They view a recording of the Quiz show and Ram explains how he was able to answer the thirteen questions.

Vikas Swarup tells a fast paced story in a unique way, each chapter linked to a question from the show. This narrative framework manages to re-create much of the tension of watching the show and tells us the story of Ram's life in a non-chronological way, each chapter being identified by question values ("1,000 rupees", "2000 rupees", etc.). Ram led a fascinating life and knew the answers to the questions, as through pure

chance each one touched on something he had learned in his eventful past.

The framework of the book is brilliant; it is an easy read, and it takes the reader with it in a swirl of amusing and moving stories woven into the rich tapestry of modern India, warts and all. The entire group enjoyed the story, although we thought the characters could have been better drawn and the book suffered from too many coincidences. A film is on the way and the book should lend itself well to being adapted for the big screen. IRB,
