

I am conscious of how often over the years I have had to disappoint a couple who wanted to be married in our Parish Church because they did not fulfil the legal requirement that one or other of them must be resident in this parish or a regular worshipper in our Parish Church. The Church must act within the law of the land in arranging for people to wed, and there was no legal way round this obstacle. I am pleased to be able to announce that since 1 October this situation has been eased considerably by the Church of England Marriage Measure, 2008.

This new piece of legislation responds to the increasing mobility of our society today, and provides for couples to be married in a particular church if they can demonstrate a "Qualifying Connection" with that parish. None of the existing rights of parishioners to marry in their parish church is affected, but these rights may now be claimed by a wider group of people for whom that church has a special significance.

The key question now is "what is a Qualifying Connection"? In very general terms, if a person wishing to marry can show that he/she was baptized in the parish, has his/her confirmation entered in the registers of that parish, or has at any time either lived in the parish for a continuous period of at least six months, or habitually attended public worship in the parish church for at least six months, then that person has established a Qualifying Connection. They will be required, of course, to produce written evidence to substantiate the claim as well as the customary evidence to confirm their identity. In addition – and this is the area which will make the most significant change – if a parent of the person wishing to marry in a particular parish lives or has lived in the parish for at least six months, or has habitually attended public worship there for that period, or if that person's parent or grandparent was married in the parish, this also establishes a Qualifying Connection. All references to a church or to a church service in these conditions relate solely to the Church of England.

I am sure this is a change – in the opinion of many of us, one which is long overdue – which will be welcomed by many, and I am delighted that I will no longer have to say "sorry, it can't be done" to people who have been brought up in our villages and have moved away, but would like to come back to be married in a place which has great significance for them. So I look forward to meeting people who want to take advantage of this change in the law in due course.

May God bless your homes, deepen the bonds of marriage, and grant us all His peace and joy.

Litter Picking

The Parish Council are desperately seeking volunteers for litter picking particularly in Edlesborough. If anyone has the odd half an hour or so a couple of times a week to tidy up The Green and empty the littler bins please contact the Clerk. Needless to say if the public were to use the litter bins provided, or to take their rubbish home to put in their own litter bins, this request would not be necessary.

Funding

The initial funding request for additional play equipment throughout the Parish has unfortunately not been forthcoming but other avenues are being explored.

Streetlighting repairs.

Various streetlights require urgent repair and the Contractors have been chased on numerous occasions to urgently get the lights working again The Parish Council are doing all they can to rectify the situation.

Allotments

Allotment rents have now been collected and any vacant plots will be offered to those on the waiting list. There are several extremely overgrown plots both at Cow Lane and Dagnall and anyone wishing to take on one of these plots, which will require complete re-cultivation, will be able to do so free of charge for 2 years.

Edlesborough Church Bridleway

A Dog Bin has been installed at Edlesborough Church end of the bridleway and it is hoped that dog owners will make use of it. To install a Dog Bin costs the Parish Council \pounds 220.00 plus the cost of having it emptied twice a week during the summer months and once a week during winter months and the Parish Council would stress again the need for these bins to be utilised for dog fouling which is constantly being left on the verges and particularly over The Green. If dog fouling is not picked up the dog owner could face a find of up to \pounds 1,000.00.

Cemetery Access

Further meetings are taking place to discuss a possible alternative suggestion for an access route.

The Parish Council wish to apologise to the parishioners and sports clubs for this incident and trust that the grass will continue to grow for a while to bring The Green back to it's normal condition.

Edlesborough School

The children in Year 6 at Edlesborough School were asked to write about Harvest Time and Sophie McCloskey wrote:-

The sun rises, glinting on the jewelled grass.

Copper autumn leaves whirl in the fresh breeze.

Little eyes scampering in the corn fields.

The humming of the combine harvesters scything the crops.

The gentle autumn sun ripening the harvest fruits.

Rosy apples and velvet plums carpeting the ground.

Delicate wings and buzzing things collecting the sweet nectar.

The setting sun in the coral sky.

As the damp haze rises over the corn stubble. Glimmering is the light of the harvest moon.

Titanic

Earlier this summer while clearing ivy and tidying the cemetery as part of his job as Village Handyperson for Eaton Bray, John noticed the name Titanic at the foot of a grave. The gravestone read as follows:

Mary Jackson wife of Jeffery Oct 1945 aged 82 years. Cecil Jackson Titanic 1912 and Arthur Jackson Arras 1917.

Wanting to know more, he then looked on the Eaton Bray website and at victims of the disaster...

It transpired that Cecil Jackson transferred to the Titanic from her sister ship the Olympic and was on board the Titanic for her delivery trip from Belfast to Southampton, and then on her maiden and only voyage. His job was 'Boots' to first class and his wage was £3.15 shillings or £3.75 per month. On that fateful night 1496 people, mostly men, (women and children first in those days) lost their lives in this terrible tragedy that is still remembered today.

Throughout Europe and America the shock of this unsinkable ship going down on her maiden voyage was tremendous and must have had its effect on this our landlocked English Village.

We can barely imagine the grief in the Jackson household, only to be repeated, as in so many homes, when that dreaded telegram announcing the death of another son, (see the Village War memorial) Arthur came some 5 years later.

Mary and Jeffrey Jackson lived at 155 The Rye and had 6 children, Arthur, Cecil, Elizabeth, Ethel, Gertrude and Henry. Poor Mrs Jackson lived on through a second World War and passed away at the end of it aged 82.

What of her husband or other relatives? Can any Focus readers add to this story?

- Village Signs Research is also being carried out in to the feasibility of erecting village signs. These signs would depict the heritage & history of the village. Each sign being unique to its respective village and erected on posts in central locations
- **Daffodil Planting**. Hopefully by the time this article goes to press planting of daffodil bulbs will have commenced. We thank St. Mary's Carnival for a donation helping to fund this. We will only have to wait until spring to see some results of actions taken by the 'Beautiful People'
- Litter Picking. Not sure how you can help beautify our villages? Volunteer litter pickers are always required, especially with the 'best kept village' competition approaching. Please get in touch if you can offer any help.

Pension Credit. Housing Benefit and Council Tax Benefit: Backdating Rule Changes

From 6 October, the time limit for a claimant aged 60 or over to make a backdated claim for pension credit, housing benefit or council tax benefit is

reduced from twelve months to three months. The time limit for a claimant aged under 60 to make a backdated claim for housing benefit or council tax benefit is reduced from 52 weeks to six months

Energy Package to Help with Fuel Bills

The government has announced a package of measures to help households save money on their energy bills.

The measures include:

- all households qualifying for at least 50 per cent off loft and cavity wall insulation. The elderly and low income households qualify at no cost
- an increase in cold weather payments from £8.50 to £25 per week if there is a severe winter
- more funds for the Warm Front home energy efficiency scheme in England, which provides grants to help cover the costs of home insulation and improving energy efficiency.

Edlesborough Book Group Review Death at La Fenice by Donna Leon



Death at La Fenice, is the first in a series of detective novels set in Venice. It introduces the reader to the character, Commissario Guido Brunetti and also to his family and colleagues.

The story begins with the dramatic discovery of the body of German maestro, Helmut Wellauer in his dressing room. It is during the intermission after the second act, during the performance of La Traviata. The maestro appears to have made many enemies during his career, all of whom appear to have good reasons to wish for his death. His homophobic views and murky past, which has included Nazi affiliations and serial womanising is all brought under the microscope. Commissario Brunetti refuses to opt for the obvious solutions and probes ever more deeply into the maestro's previous history and relationships painstakingly uncovering more and more relevant details about him and his life.

The novel is well constructed, but seems a little dated in its format, with not a lot of depth to its characters to interest the reader. Donna Leon obviously has a passionate love for Venice and sets the scene well, introducing us to the canals and alleyways of the city as well as to the Brunettis' domestic life.

The majority of the book group members found the book too lightweight, and the crime too easy to solve. But one member spoke passionately and very convincingly about the series as a whole, persuading us that it addressed serious issues in modern Italy under the guise of crime novels. Thus, we were persuaded to give Donna Leon another chance in the future.

Salvation Sound...November 2008

November - What can one say about this month? Nights come early - morning is late. The year is dying - colour is fading - gold, yellow, ochre, brown, dull green - summer is being swept away in heaps of dead leaves. The smells of burning bonfires fill the air - winter is coming, fast!

The boy stayed with them until Christmas morning, when he revealed to them that he was the Christ-Child. Then he vanished from Hermann and his family.

Hermann felt sad that the boy had had to go, but the next time that he passed the place where he had first found the boy, he saw some beautiful flowers growing through the snow. With great joy he gathered some of them and took them to his wife. She called them flowers of gold, which is what the word chrysanthemum means.

Scripture says,

Mothers Union Report Eaton Bray with Edlesborough

In October the M.U. held a 'Mothers' Union Celebration' in St. Mary's Church, conducted by the Rev. Malcolm Grant, with a special commemoration to honour two of the members, Celia French and Dorothy Bradbury who served in the Women's Land Army during the war.

In January of this year, the Government announced that a special badge was being

issued to all former members of the Land Army, and both these ladies have applied for their badges. In the meantime, and much to their surprise, the M.U. held its own celebration.

Celia French was born and brought up near Newcastle. Sadly both her parents died when she was only a child, and she feels that her experiences in the Land Army changed her life – that is particularly true, because she met, fell in love, and married her husband Edwin, and became a farmer's wife until Edwin's death, although she still lives at their farm. She was 'posted' to Silsoe, and became resident at Wrest Park where 36 girls were housed. They worked in 'gangs' of twelve and were taken – by some form of transport – to any farm in quite a large area where help was needed, and if they farm was 'nearby' – they walked!

Both ladies recalled how hard the work was, the hours were long winter and summer, hot summers were difficult in heavy clothes – and no sun cream – and winter mornings dark and cold. Celia had particularly horrifying tales of mice and threshing machines, with mice which ran up trouser legs.....

Dorothy had quite different experiences to Celia. She originated in Cavendish, and was posted to a village near Bury St. Edmonds. Her father's family originated in Devon and she had many family holidays in the country with them, but that didn't prepare her very well for actually working on the land. She worked for one farmer on a permanent basis with another Land Army Girl, and they were the only two in the village. They did not live at the farm - Dorothy lived at the butcher's house and her friend lived at the baker's house. (Unfortunately there was no one to live with the candlestick maker!) They had to deal with the animals as well, and she has memories of being knocked over in the pigsty; lost her two big toe nails on about four occasions and learned very quickly not to stand or walk behind a horse!

It was an honour just to hear these two elegant, lovely, cheerful ladies talk about their past.

Keep Local History Alive!



For those interested in local history, there are three new books out for Xmas. The first entitled **"Signals A Railway Miscellany: Hertfordshire Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire"** by Murray Eckett, an enthusiast who has researched the railway system, railway walks and the preservation. In Bedfordshire, he covers the Marston Vale Line and describes walks along the Leighton Buzzard to Dunstable line, Luton Parkway to Harpenden

East, Bedford to Hitchin, Bedford to Cambridge and Bedford to Northampton. The second book is called **"We wouldn't have missed it for the world" The Women's Land Army in Bedfordshire 1939-1950** by Stuart Antrobus. Based on

extensive research and numerous interviews with former land girls, this book takes us back to the days of wartime activity, of military airfields and the presence of American GIs. A definitive alphabetical list of almost 3500 maiden names will enable family historians to find if their forebears served as land girls in Bedfordshire.


The final book is more light hearted. It is the story of Russ Sainty, a performer at the legendary California Ballroom in Dunstable. Russ and his group, The Nu-Notes performed no less than 338 sessions up



to the mid-sixties, including the opening night of March 12th 1960. During over 50 years in show business he has met and performed with so many famous stars. Russ's story, entitled **"King of the Cali' A Lifetime in Rock n' Roll"** is a roller coaster ride of triumph and disappointment, but is told with truth and integrity.

The Road to Banjul



A former Focus contributor has recently published a book about a journey he undertook last year to raise funds for charity. You may remember Keith Pugsley, author of "Village People", a series of vignettes about local Eaton Bray heroes and notables which appeared in this publication during 2000. Keith lived in Totternhoe Road, Eaton Bray, until February 2001 when he and his wife Gilly ("Mistress of Black Pig Farm"-see Focus October

2000) and their 50 pet animals relocated to North Devon. In 2007 Keith undertook an adventurous mission to drive a twenty-year old Cherokee Jeep from the UK

to The Gambia. His 320-page paperback "The Road to Banjul" is in two parts – the first part describes the meticulous preparation for the mission and the second part gives a day by day commentary of events and characters encountered on the way.

With co-driver Graham De Meur (also a former resident of Eaton Bray, see Focus March 2000) Black Betty the Jeep travelled from Plymouth through France, Spain, Gibraltar, Morocco, Western Sahara, Mauritania, and Senegal before arriving in Banjul – capital of The Gambia. On the near 4000 mile three-week journey they experienced desert conditions, unmade roads, bureaucracy, corrupt officials, border delays, sub-standard plumbing, and met some friendly and helpful people – and a few who won't be making it onto Keith and Graham's Christmas card lists. On arrival in Banjul the car was offered for auction which, together with sponsorship raised before and during the mission, netted a five-figure sum for Keith's chosen charity the North Devon Animal Ambulance, as well as money for children's charities in The Gambia.

The Rotary Club of Dunstable



News from Terry Jones, AVDC Councillor for Ivinghoe Aston, Edlesborough, Northall & Dagnall

The Aylesbury Waterside Theatre

The building of the new theatre, now named The Aylesbury Waterside Theatre, continues at a good pace and the differences are highly visible from day to day and certainly week to week. Anybody who has not visited the site recently will notice a considerable difference with the building rising high above the hoardings. The build cost is £35 million which provides a 1,200 seat theatre and a smaller 220 seater venue. At today's prices it compares very well with the £52 million for the Leicester Arts Centre (760 seats) and Milton Keynes at £49.84 million (1,336 seats). The project has never been over spent in that the Council has always adjusted its capital expenditure to cover any increase in costs. In order to maintain the costs at a lower level there have been changes to the specification but none that will directly affect the public. The next significant stage will be reached in the Spring when the topping out ceremony is due to take place and we remain optimistic that the whole building will finish at around Christmas 2009. Our biggest fear has to be a severe Winter which will inevitably slow building.

Theatre in the Villages

Theatre in the Villages season started this September with 11 shows taking place in Aylesbury Vale. These shows are dependent upon the commitment and hard work of local promoters in the villages who liaise between the Theatre in the Villages coordinator to choose the show that might be right for their particular community and for drumming up enthusiasm within the village to attend the show, to meet the artists and to run the box office etc. The project has been running for over ten years now and has shown to be a very popular means of providing a community event and generating income within a village. Car Parking in Aylesbury

A decision has been made that will mean there is no free parking this year in Aylesbury

The new town car park based in Walton Street was opened last month and provides approximately 500 extra spaces and 25 disabled spaces. It is constructed to the very latest specifications for safer car parks, is monitored throughout by CCTV and does away with the pillars that are so dreaded by most users of multi-storey car parks. It will provide the first of the new car parks in Avlesbury which will serve both the town centre and the new theatre

Edlesborough W.I.

At our recent meeting Mr. Smallwood, a glass blower by trade, gave an interesting talk on the production of glass. He told us that glass is made up as follows: - G-gas.

L-lime, A-aluminium or arsenic, S-sand (86%), S-soda. It was discovered thousands of years ago, and the method of heating sand to a molten mass is still used today as it was all those years ago.

Each form of glass is made in a different way. For instance, hollow glass is blown and revolved on the end of a pontil. Moulds used to be used to make bottles, etc., and the ends of the neck of the bottle would be chipped off. Mr. Smallwood had examples of some old bottles, including the green and blue ridged ones used for containing poisons. Flat glass, made by machine nowadays, was made by heating it to a 30lb ball - a gob - on the pontil. The end would be cut off and the remainder heated again & again until flat. Afterwards, it was cut into shapes for such things as small windows.

Glass is a poor conductor of heat, but a good conductor of light. It can be toughened for products such as windscreens which are extremely strong. Coloured glass is produced by adding metal oxide, and beautiful crystal glass is made by the addition of lead.

Mr. Smallwood had a display of many forms of glass products. Very popular with the ladies were a number of attractive items of glass jewellery! It was certainly a very popular talk and display of so many different ways of using glass.

Edlesborough W.I. is 80 years old this year, and we celebrated by holding our Birthday Dinner at Dunstable Downs Golf Club. As in previous years, we were served an excellent meal by the friendly staff, and our thanks go to Ann Brinklow for making the arrangements. Mary Forlenza was our after-dinner speaker on the subject of "Women".

Her talk was both humorous and serious. Mary compared her life of wife and mother to that of women who have made an impact on people worldwide. She shared with us amusing memories of her family life. On the serious aspect of her talk, she spoke of her admiration for women such as Anne Frank. Who could fail to be moved when reading the wartime diaries of this young girl?
