Office of the Police & Grime Commissioner for Ectloridhire

This year the budget for Bedfordshire Police is £102.8million. That sounds like a lot of money until you remember that budget will have been reduced by £19million by 2015 due to the government's 20% cut to the police grant, a further £24million a year is lost to the Force because Whitehall doesn't give us what their own funding formula says we need, and the amount we pay locally for policing through the council tax is well below the national average. So Bedfordshire Police is a rurally funded force that faces some distinctly metropolitan challenges.

Bedfordshire Police staff and officers have therefore performed remarkably well reducing recorded crime across the county by 15% in the last year (1899 fewer across Central Bedfordshire as a whole) at the same time as going through significant re-organisation and a reduction in the number of police officers due to the budget cuts.

The government will unveil a new spending review shortly, which is expected to herald yet further police cuts. I am opposed to such cuts but my role is to deal with the world as I find it rather than as I would wish it to be.

So the challenge for the future for Bedfordshire Police, and indeed for all of

us, is how do we keep our communities safe at a time when the budget is still be shrinking?

The answer is that we need to forge a closer and stronger partnership between our local communities and their police and all recognise the police cannot and never have been able to fight crime on their own. Wherever we live in the county we all have a duty to support the police if we want our communities to be safe, whether this means passing on information about criminal activity, being prepared to support the local Neighbourhood Watch, Street Watch and Speed Watch scheme or, for the most committed, volunteering as a Special Constable so that each community has a visible policing presence.

There must be a genuine partnership, so Bedfordshire Police will work hard to value the support communities and volunteers give. Whereas in the past such close partnership has always been

desirable, in the future it is clear that it will be absolutely essential, which is why this is such a priority for me as your Police and Crime Commissioner.

On June 9th we should all have been visiting the gardens of Eaton Bray and Edlesborough (I mentioned this last month) but sadly the inclement weather this Winter and Spring has put a stop to that. I am, I have to admit, relieved because my garden might have been a disappointment. I'm certain there would have been colour but mainly of the dandelion hue. At the moment all blooms in the Vicarage garden seem to be bright yellow but the rest is just green grass, green leaves and yellowish green moss - although we do have a glorious copper beech.

Our church, on the other hand, will be a colourful place in June with wedding flowers, constantly changing altar frontals and church hangings, as well as different coloured stoles (scarves) that I wear for Holy Communion services. It will be a riot of green, red, white and gold. Why? Because excluding the 13th and 21st June the Church celebrates the lives of at least one different saint on each of the other days.

There are some notable martyrs (red) including: Justin who was beheaded in the year 165, the martyrs of Uganda in 1885 and more recently in the 1970's and 1980's and of course St Alban, the first martyr of Britain, probably beheaded in the year 250. We remember St Alban on the 22nd when once again there will be celebrations in St Albans with a Pilgrimage Procession beginning at 11am from St Peter's Church and finishing at the West End of the Cathedral. This is followed by a Festival Eucharist at 12 noon. It might be a good idea not to drive into the town centre that day!

Fortunately not all saints are martyrs and the June selection includes Samuel and Henrietta Barnett, social reformers working in the East End of London in the late 19th century, a number of notable Bishops and the spiritual writer Evelyn Underhill who died in 1941. We use white or gold for these saints.

Being positive while I sit here I find myself humming 'June is bustin' out all over' from the musical Carousel, which reminds me that the St Mary's Village Carnival on Saturday 6th July is fast approaching. Let's hope that this year it will be a dry sunny day and lots of money will be raised for the chosen charities. In the current climate many charities are finding it difficult to raise adequate funds to meet the needs of the groups and individuals they support. They need whatever support we can give, however small.

Gracious Lord, we pray for all those saints of today who dedicate their lives to the needs of others and we give grateful thanks for the good things that we have and for those who help us. Amen.



Cypsy and Traveller Local Plan Consultation Coming Scon

Central Bedfordshire Council's Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan is set to open for public consultation on Monday, 20 May.

The draft Plan, which includes a recommended 'short-list' of sites for Gypsy and Traveller accommodation, will be open for consultation until Monday, 1 July.

Residents will be able to give their views via the Planning pages of our website, while paper copies of the documents will also be available at council offices and libraries.

Cllr Nigel Young, Executive Member for Sustainable Communities (Strategic Planning and Economic Development) said: "Our Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan has provoked some strong reactions and the 'short-list' of sites has certainly caused considerable debate. It's important that we try to meet the housing needs of all our local communities – yet we also want to fully understand the potential impact of our proposals. The upcoming consultation is the best opportunity for you to have your say on it.

"Those of you who have written or emailed already, please do so again via the questionnaire from 20th, as this is the time to make your views count. This questionnaire gives you the freedom to say what you want, using the guidelines which are necessary to make it suitable for assessment by the Planning Inspector. You will also have the opportunity to ask to make a verbal representation to the Planning Inspector, who will be given all the comments made as part of the consultation."

All submissions made as part of this upcoming consultation will be provided to the Secretary of State, who will appoint an independent Planning Inspector to examine the Plan and process. A public examination will follow in early 2014 after which the Planning Inspector will make his final ruling - either to support the Plan or ask the council to look at it again. Details about how to fill out the

consultation online will be provided before 20 May.

Operation Arctic, a joint campaign to reduce burglary during the winter period has seen burglary offences reduce by 22% which equates to 36 fewer offences between 1st October 2012 to 31stJanuary 2013 compared to the same period the previous year.

Nonetheless we have identified a small series of offences since January where thieves are targeting jewellery from unoccupied houses. These have been in sporadic locations of Aylesbury Vale.

In total there has been 18 offences linked to this series from 1st January 2013-5th March 2013 and these have been during the hours of 0800-2330 on varying days of the week. Entry has been gained by jemmying a side/rear window or door. Offenders have been taking jewellery and the odd electrical item.

We are appealing for the public to be alert and to report any suspicious activity as soon as it occurs. Note down descriptions and car registrations.

Police advice to project your jewellery from being stolen:

- Ensure your home looks occupied when you are out – use a timer switch to set a radio and/or lamp to come on. As with other valuables, ensure that jewellery is not left on display.
- Ensure that your home has good window and door security and use it. Double lock uPVC doors using the keys as well as lifting the handle, even if going out briefly.
- If you have an alarm ensure that you always activate it at night and when you leave the property.
- Photograph your jewellery. By doing this the police will have a clear description of the items if they are stolen.
- Use forensic marking to identify your jewellery. Further information can be found at www.securedbydesign.com
- Ensure that all of your jewellery is adequately covered by your insurance.

Defensive Planting for Household Security

Nature herself provides one of the best solutions to many garden crimes. With careful thought and planning you can reduce the risk of becoming a victim of garden crime or household burglary, whilst at the same time creating an attractive garden.

Follow these top tips to transform your garden into a haven as well as a deterrent against intruders:

- Defensive Planting: Nature's own way to reduce crime. Criminals don't like climbing through prickly plants and hedges. They know that a small item of ripped clothing or blood can help the police identify them. Ideal plants to use are:
 - 1. Tall prickly shrubs such as Berberis Julianae or Ilex.
 - 2. Dense shrubs such as Berberis Stenophylla and Mahonia.
- Thieves don't like to be heard: Crunchy gravel on the approach to the house which gives away their presence is ideal.
- Front Garden: The general rule for the front of the house is to keep boundary fences and hedges low to allow as much natural surveillance as possible from neighbours, passing pedestrians and traffic. Keep shrubs and trees well pruned to avoid any hiding places.
- The rear garden: Back gardens should have a secure boundary and gates/ fences which should be of sufficient height to make scaling them difficult. Thieves hate to be cornered and will always be looking for escape routes. The traditional country hedge provides an attractive and impenetrable boundary. Prickly shrubs planted along


an existing fence are effective and attractive but may take a long time to grow and thicken up.

- Patio furniture: Large numbers of hammocks and parasols are stolen from gardens every year. Take time to mark the items with your post code using a UV pen or a DNA liquid property marking kit (for example Selecta DNA).
- Water features: A pond can form part of a defensive boundary as well as the finishing touch to your garden.

Pick Up After Your Pooch

Central Bedfordshire Council are asking dog owners to be responsible and bag and bin their dogs' waste to keep the area clean and healthy.

Not only is dog mess a nasty business, it also poses serious health risks. It can carry roundworm - containing the parasite Toxocara canis which can cause blindness, epilepsy, asthma and infections. So it's vital to reduce dog fouling to protect others and particularly children.

Keep Britain Tidy's latest report (2010) suggested that the UK dog population was estimated to be 8 million, with dogs producing approximately 1,000 tonnes of excrement each day.

Failing to clean up after your dog when in a public space is an offence and you could face a £75 Fixed Penalty Notice or a court imposed fine of up to £1,000. The Council is stepping up its efforts to tackle the problem and Dog Wardens are actively patrolling the area and can issue on-the-spot fines to owners for dogfouling offences.

Councillor Brian Spurr, Executive Member for Sustainable Communities, said: "Dog fouling is anti-social behaviour which we take extremely seriously. We know that it is a matter of concern to lots of local residents too because they have been letting us know. Unfortunately the problem lies with a selfish minority of people who don't take the legal responsibility of dog ownership seriously enough.

"We're working hard to ensure that Central Bedfordshire continues to be a great place to live and work and have upped the Dog Warden patrols and made sure that there are around 625 easy to find dog waste bins around the area. We would encourage anyone who witnesses an incident of

dog fouling to report it immediately by emailing customers@centralbedfordshire. gov.uk or by calling 0300 300 8302."

So if you're walking your dog please take a doggy bag, pick up after and use the dog waste bins provided. Remember you can also use the normal litter bins if there are none nearby, or alternatively bag it and bin it at home - there are no excuses!

Highlights from the Minutes of the Meeting on Monday 8th April

Central Beds Representative (CBC)

- *Gypsy & Traveller Plan:* The Executive Committee has recommended the Council approve the draft Gypsy & Traveller Plan for publication and submission to the Secretary of State. The draft plan, which includes a recommended 'short-list' of seven proposed site will now go to Council on 18th April and then will be open for full public consultation in May or June.
- *Tenancy Strategy:* A new approach for how people can access and benefit from social housing in Central Beds has been approved by the Executive. From April, the Council will give tenants a 12-month introductory tenancy, followed by a flexible tenancy for a fixed period of five years. Those tenants, who remain in need, will be able to renew their existing tenancy for a further five years or move to a different home if their existing one no longer matches their needs.
- *Free NHS Health Checks:* These are available to anyone aged between 40 and 74 years who have not already had a stroke, heart disease, chronic kidney disease or diabetes. The checks take only 20-30 minutes. Those eligible for a Health Check should look out for their letter of invitation or contact their local GP.
- *Bag it and bin it!* Dog owners are being urged by Waste Services and Community Safety to bag and bin their dogs' waster to keep the area clean. Dog mess poses serious health risks; it can carry roundworm containing the parasite Toxacara canis which can cause blindness, epilepsy, asthma and infections. Failing to clean up after

our four legged friend in a public space is an OFFENCE and the Council will issue a £75 Fixed Penalty Notice. *Dog wardens are monitoring areas across Central Beds.*

Police

- There have been 4 reported crimes for March: 1x theft from motor vehicle, 1x criminal damage to vehicle, 1x interference with motor vehicle, 1x theft to property; in addition there was 1x incident of anti-social behavior which the police have actioned upon.
- The Parish Council raised residents concerns regarding the increase in burglaries in the area. The police are aware of this matter and confirmed that it is mainly down to one particular group. They wanted to reassure residents that they are monitoring and dealing with the situation.

Election Result – Parish Councillor

The election took place on Thursday 4th April last: Numbers of electorate 2109, Ballot papers 402, turnout 19.05% - Teresa Stack-Murray 132 votes; Lorna Tribbick 270 votes – Elected. The Parish Council welcomed newly elected Cllr. Lorna Tribbick to Eaton Bray Parish Council.

weather, the next phase in the planting of the village tubs will be underway.

News from the Lions Den...

Every year, a tragedy quietly strikes thousands of families. While it may not be mentioned in the news or in your local papers, measles takes the lives of 380 children each day or 139 300 children per year. Of those who survive, nearly 30% suffer complications such as loss of vision, hearing loss, brain damage, pneumonia or vitamin A deficiency.

Measles is a highly contagious, viral disease spread through close contact with an infected person. If there is just one person infected with measles on a crowded bus of 100 passengers, 90 of those people will become infected if they have not had a vaccination.

Measles remains a heavy public burden in developing countries where parents do not have access to immunization services that could protect their child from this disease. We could have been forgiven for thinking this is all far removed from our lives until November last year when the Measles epidemic swept through Wales at an alarming rate and is predicted to be heading our way shortly. At the end of April, almost 900 people had been infected in the Swansea outbreak, with 80 needing hospital treatment and one suspected death.

The measles outbreak shows no sign of ending, with the number of cases rising to 886 - up 78 in five days and 121 in a week.

Eighty people have now needed hospital treatment in Swansea alone since the outbreak began in November and more than 10,000 people across Wales have been given a triple jab against measles, mumps and rubella (MMR). Public Health Wales (PHW) says there is still an "urgent need" for more children to be vaccinated. It is believed that many children may

not have been vaccinated following the publication of Dr Andrew Wakefield's now discredited research in 1998, which linked the MMR jab with autism.

In 2010 Lions began to try and eradicate measles within four specific regions, Ethiopia, Madagascar, Mali and Nigeria. The efforts of the Lions was extremely successful, resulting in 41 million children being vaccinated within these four countries. By October 2012, Lions had vaccinated 150 million children across the globe.

There remains much work to be done in the fight against measles but Lions have the power to eliminate this disease. Lions are now helping children in ALL countries where measles remains a public health burden. To this end, our club has been making donations towards the measles campaign. Not only does this money help children all over the world but it stands us all in good steed if the disease continues to spread at the rate currently predicted. It is only a matter of time before the epidemic reaches us and we are proud to have donated money towards ensuring we are prepared.

Better Backs in the Driving Seat

Nowadays, many of us spend a great deal of time driving. A study found that people driving over 25,000 miles a year averaged just over 22 days a year off work with a 'bad back'.

Here are few tips to improve your posture and help your back when driving:

- 1. Ensure the controls are within easy reach. Bring your seat forward so that you can easily reach the pedals without over-stretching, which can cause increased strain.
- 2. Your backrest should provide adequate support. The driver's seat should provide good support to the lower back, both lengthways and sideways. Many cars have a lumbar support which you can adjust. If not, consider purchasing a lumbar roll which can be attached to the backrest by a strap.
- 3. Ensure the headrest is in a comfortable position. Comfortably rest your head on the headrest with your neck and shoulder muscles relaxed. Avoid sitting with your chin poking forwards.
- 4. Take care getting in and out the car. To avoid twisting, slide your seat backwards. To get out of the car, turn your whole body towards the door, lower your feet to the ground and then

stand up. To get in the car, sit on the edge of the seat first and then rotate your whole body into position.



- 5. Be careful loading or unloading items from your vehicle. Careful lifting items in and out of the boot. Minimise stretching and lifting by placing loads nearest to the bumper edge.
- 6. Keep calm and carry on. Don't grip the wheel too tightly - this can increase muscular tension. In a traffic jam, take some deep breaths, lift your shoulders to your ears and then relax. Take regular breaks on long journeys. Get out of the car and have a short walk round and do a few gentle stretches.

Edlesborough Eook Croup Dark Eden by Chris Beckett

When we discussed our forward reading list for 2013, it was pointed out that we rarely read Science Fiction. This we set out to rectify and Dark Eden was nominated by one of our members. Both the book and its author were unknown to most of us, but it proved to be an excellent choice.

The book is set beyond the solar system in outer space, on a planet lit only by strange trees and plants which emit light and warmth, and by animals with glowing eves. It is inhabited by human beings. descended from two astronauts who were marooned there after a failed space mission. Now, one hundred and sixty vears later, their descendants number five hundred, but genetic dysfunction and mental limitations, caused by continual inbreeding, are beginning to take their toll. Also the "Family" as they have dubbed themselves, have been confined to just one area for all this time and have gradually drained its resources. "Family" is divided into groups with leaders and follow rules laid down by the original founders, Tommy and Angela, of whom memories are vague and only maintained by artefacts left behind by them, about which stories are told

But, a serpent enters Eden in the shape of a young teenage "new hair" who sees the inherent dangers of remaining static and

Stone's Fall is an epic historical thriller spanning the mid nineteenth century until the early twentieth century giving a detailed account of the banking and industrial systems of the time and how deeply enmeshed they were. In 1953 Matthew Braddock an ex reporter is reminded of his youth by an invitation to the funeral of a wealthy woman who

urges the elders to look into the future and explore new ways and ideas before they all starve. No one has ever dared to leave the Valley before and cross into the Darkness beyond but John Redlantern defies the elders and leaves the group, inspiring a small number of young people to follow him. In doing so, he also upsets the equilibrium of the society and the first violence ever erupts.

We are then taken on their expedition into the unknown and the development of their various characters in the face of hardship. John is a charismatic but flawed leader and his restless spirit proves difficult for his followers.

The story is told in the first person by a group of characters, telling a chapter each. This gives us multiple views of the situation, but also tends to cause the narrative to hiccup. That is only a minor criticism. One has to admire the sweep of the author's imagination; his ability to create a totally new world with an idiomatic language and way of life, complete with strange flora and fauna.

The comments of our group were largely favourable. Our imaginations had been made to work overtime and the points raised had given us a good discussion. We thought that with a rather open ending, Chris Beckett had left room for a sequel.

Stone's Fall by lain Pears

had once employed him. In her will he has been left a package to be opened after her death. He remembers their meeting in 1909 after the death of her husband, the industrialist John Stone. Stone, although incredibly successful and very rich, was something of an enigma. He controlled an enormous international empire seemingly single handed, with very few of his employees given his trust. He died in an unexplained accident falling from a first floor window of his home and his will contains a bequest to a child of whom his widow Elizabeth is unaware She asks Matthew to help her unravel the mystery. She is young and very beautiful and Matthew finds himself fascinated and intrigued by her.

From 1909 the novel moves back in time. to Paris in the 1890's then to Venice in 1867 when John Stone tells his own story and helps us to understand and solve the

evening.

Each of the three parts of the story are extremely detailed and closely written. In the second part the building of Stone's organisation and his financial dealings are plainly set out and easy to understand making this a very satisfying and unusual book to read

Edlesborough Parish Council Chairman's Report

Presented to Edlesborough Annual representatives Parish Meeting on Thursday 18th April 2013

This is my third report as Chairman and covers the period April 2012 - March 2013

During the year, further progress has been made in the Council's continuing endeavours encourage to more parishioner involvement and interest in Council and community affairs. For the first time ever. a Parish Council Meeting was held in each of Northall and Dagnall. where eleven and sixteen parishioners respectively attended for the whole meeting. Probably much to their surprise, many of them found the proceedings very interesting and informative! Their contributions and feedback were certainly much appreciated by the Council. It is now the Council's intention to hold meetings in the villages of Northall and Dagnall on an annual basis.

During the year the Council continued to publish regular 'News Reports' in 'Focus' each month, and on occasions, supplemented this by using its e-mail list to share some issues with parishioners. The website www.edlesborough.gov.uk still remains as the main notice board for all Parish Council activities and local news, and it appears to be used more and more by parishioners

The Council has also instigated a series of meetings with the existing four Sports Clubs so that their members can take a more active interest and responsibility in the running of the Pavilion. This has now led to a Public Meeting being planned for the 16th June 2013 in Edlesborough Memorial Hall.

The Meeting will hosted be by

of the Parish Council existing Sports Clubs and others interested



in improving the sports and social facilities in the village.

The Council hopes that manv as parishioners as possible will attend, as it is their opportunity to help shape and influence the future sporting and social life in Edlesborough - and in particular the future of Edlesborough Pavilion.

Of course, strong community involvement is still very much at the heart of the highly successful EDaN (the Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall) Parish Plan Steering Group and its various Action Teams:

- the Transportation Team. whose Community Car Scheme has just celebrated its second anniversary. With 16 drivers, 43 registered passengers and some 424 trips so far, the Scheme has gone from strength to strength in providing car lifts for residents on local journeys to hospitals shops, doctors' surgery etc. More drivers would be very welcome, especially from Edlesborough and Northall Please contact Peter Williams on 01442 842506 to learn how you could make a valuable contribution to your community.
- the Traffic Management Team, which is now focusing its attention on the width/pinch points and inappropriate use of the A4146 by heavy goods vehicles, especially London waste The Team is also aiming to lorries. raise funds to replace the existing 'Speed Watch' radar equipment (three volunteers needed for each session). with the latest 'Sentinel' version which

can be operated almost remotely.

- the Cycleways, Pavements and Footpaths Team, whose work has stalled somewhat during the year, but it should be reinvigorated by interest and possible funds from the Local Area Forum of Bucks County Council, who are beginning to provide some help on new cycleways.
- the 'Friends of the Church on the Hill at Edlesborough'Team, whose mission is to make much more community use of this wonderful part of our heritage and thereby help to safeguard it for centuries to come. They have met with the Churches Conservation Trust (CCT),

and the Historic Buildings Officer of Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC), who have been verv supportive of the Friends' plans to install a kitchen and toilets and who made some constructive suggestions. Further progress has also been made in pursuing the

Beautifying the Villages Team's project to flood-light the church, and the CCT's desire for the church to be much more freely open to visitors. There are a lot of 'stakeholders' to satisfy to get anything done, but the Friends are very strong in numbers and resolute in achieving their objectives.

The 'Friends' are hoping that lots of parishioners and others will attend at least one of the many ambitious events being held in the first ever **Edlesborough Arts Festival**, which will take place at the Church on the 7th, 8th and 9th of June 2013.

Although the 'Friends' will continue to work closely with the Parish Council and the EDaN Beautifying the Villages Team, they are planning to become an independent entity, with their own constitution, trustees and bank account etc. I should like to take this opportunity of thanking Alan Williams for his determination and leadership in playing such a pivotal role in helping to get the 'Friends' established.

• the **Beautifying the Villages Team**, whose work in Edlesborough over the past few years was particularly recognised by the judges when they awarded Edlesborough as the winner of the Best Kept Village in Buckinghamshire competition for 2013.

Since the Council originally began work

on preparing a Parish Plan in 2005, it has provided total funds of £14,245 and EDaN has been very successful in raising its own funds of £17,535, making a total EDaN income of £31,780. Expenditure to date has been £25,069 leaving a balance of £6,711 to be carried forward for projects

in 2013/14.

On behalf of the Council, and indeed all parishioners, I should like to place on record our very grateful thanks and appreciation for the splendid work being carried out by all the **EDaN** teams.

The Parish Council continues to spend a lot of its time on **Traffic Calming**, speed and parking matters. Following the hard-fought for implementation of the delayed Speed Review in April 2012, Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC), had to be chased relentlessly to paint the various and much needed 30mph roundels on the roads in Northall. BCC continue to be chased to remove all the redundant speed sign posts in Northall, Edlesborough and Dagnall. New "dragon's teeth" on the relocated 30 mph A4146 entry to Edlesborough near Sparrow Hall Farm, will be installed by BCC when the old teeth have worn out.

The Parish Council had originally campaigned for the speed limit on the whole of the A4146 from Travellers Rest to Edlesborough to be reduced from the national speed limit of 60mph to 40mph. In the event, the 40mph limit was only approved for the first 300m from Travellers Rest. The Council has, however, continued its campaign because of parishioners' real concerns about traffic turning into and from Ivinghoe Way and Cocks Close/Pebblemoor, and the lack of a "buffer" zone entering the 30mph limit at Church End. BCC have re-affirmed their view that the stretch of 60 mph 4146 does not meet Government guide lines for 40mph, but there might be a remote possibility of a 50mph limit, subject to further speed analysis. To enable this analysis to go ahead the Parish Council has agreed to pay the costs.

Following AVDC's introduction of the new re-cycling bin scheme last autumn, the Parish Council provided additional bin stickers to maintain weekly continuity of the campaign to make drivers aware of the appropriate 30 and 40mph speed limits in the parish.

In June, the final section of white **'no parking' lines** was installed by BCC - between the bus stop cage in the High Street and its junction with the A4146. This has certainly helped deter inconsiderate and illegal parking which otherwise makes it so hazardous for vehicles entering and leaving the High Street at this dangerous junction with the A4146.

BCC has been requested to provide a school crossing patrol in Dunstable Road, Dagnall. The outcome will depend on the

results of a survey regarding the volume of traffic using the Dunstable Road between 8.20am and 8.50am whilst children and parents are endeavouring to cross this very busy road on the way to Dagnall School.

The long delayed opening of the 'Gaddesden Walk' in Dunstable Road Dagnall now depends on BCC's safety audit of a proposal to erect 10m of road side barriers to prevent children rushing out of the footpath and into the busy road. parishioners have complained Many over the years of the chronic car parking at the surgery in Cow Lane. The Parish Council's suggestion to utilise some of the amenity land between the surgery and the rear gardens of the houses in Wren Walk was, unfortunately, ruled out by AVDC because of the original legal restrictions placed on the land by the donor developer and AVDC



"I don't believe it!"

Already we are halfway through this year, how time flies. June brings forth an abundance of wild flowers: the margins of our country lanes are enlivened by the white umbels of cow parsley, and the flat headed clusters of pink or white varrow: the golden flowers of cinquefoil, which is often mistaken for buttercups, and on some slopes the tall pink flowers of the rosebay willow herb; and dandelions, which seem to be always with us. On the Downs, harebells and many kinds of different grasses can be found. Tiny flowers like the scarlet pimpernel, and a little blue flower, which from childhood I have called "bird's eves", and of course buttercups and daisies.

When we really look at our surroundings there are so many different species of plants to be seen. I say plants not weeds, for all that is cultivated nowadays started life somewhere by being a wild flower.

Sadly I have become a little bit of a "sitting-room botanist" but why not put your powers of observation to the test next time you go for a walk, or a day out. Over the centuries, many of our flowers have taken on a public significance. "The rose of England", the daffodil of Wales". Scotland has the thistle. Ireland the shamrock. Then we relate Christmas with holly, mistletoe and ivy, Easter with primroses and lilies, and Palm Sunday with pussy willow and catkins, which give us the sense that Spring has arrived. Summer, well that is for daisy chains and plantain catapults. Autumn, conkers, hips and haws and so we come back to winter. Plants and flowers connect us with the seasons. In the Bible there are not many references to actual flowers, but it does speak of the farming year and agriculture,

and in the book of Isaiah chapter 40 it tells us that "All mankind are like grass; they last no longer than wild flowers. Grass withers and flowers fade but the word of our God endures for ever."

Wreathing honeysuckles, self entwined and twig entangled bush and briar o'er run. "Gather ye rose-buds, while ye may, old time is still aflying and this same flower that smiles today, tomorrow will be dying".

Probably because familiarity breeds neglect there are people who every day. and perhaps throughout their lives, pass by such beauty without noticing it, as if their eyes were shut. Only when asked to name or describe do they become aware of their lack of knowledge. With so much building going on around our villages the sad fact is that we are seemingly determined to destroy the ties which through the ages have linked man and nature. Cultivated gardens with manicured lawns are lovely but, "Here in the country's heart where the grass is green, life is the same sweet life as it e'er bath been, trust in a God still lives. and the bell at morn floats with a thought of God o'er the rising corn. God comes down in the rain and the crop grows tall. This is the country faith, and the best of all! so wrote Norman Gale

Plants and gardens, overgrown cemeteries, thickets, and fields, avenues of trees, many a flower is contained by these "So the earth produced all kinds of plants; and God was pleased with what He saw".

Pray don't pass by the humble weed that in the hedgerow grows. Remember in God's eyes it's as lovely as a rose.

For He implanted lovliness in every single seed, SO LOOK AND SEE THE BEAUTY, IN THAT LITTLE TINY WEED!

St Mary's Parochial Church Council met for the first time since the Annual Meeting and the main business of the evening was to appoint officers to the Council and subcommittee members. Following this we received the treasurer's report and were pleased to hear that changes to legislation concerning Gift Aid now enable us to claim back tax paid on cash gifts made through open-plate collections.

Catherine reported that plans for the proposed toilet extension and the process of obtaining a Faculty (official permission) are progressing well. She has had further discussions with the church architect and plans to meet with him and members of the project committee in June when they will also discuss the kitchen-in-a-cupboard proposal. Our projected date for completion of the extension is December 2014.

Another exciting development at St Mary's is the commissioning of a new altar table for the North Chapel. This will be of modern design but will reflect existing designs on the pulpit and choir stalls. This altar will give flexibility to our worship

as it will be possible to re-locate it when required, to the chancel step. A further faculty will be required for the project which is being funded by anonymous donors to whom we are extremely grateful for their generosity.

Coralie said how much she had enjoyed the Easter services; the 10am service on Easter Sunday with many children present was a very happy occasion and the quiet reflectiveness of the Good Friday devotions which followed the more rumbustious but delightful happenings of Messy Church earlier in the day, was most uplifting. She is very pleased by the growth of Messy Church and TOTs and thanked all who are involved in making these happen. St Mary's is growing and developing and looking towards the future.
