One Hundred Years on from the Egginning of World War I The "Not Forgotten" Flower Laying Ceremony at Edlesborough War Memorial- August 4th 2014

By the 4th of August 1914, a little more than 5 weeks after the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand at Sarajevo, a large part of Europe was at war. Germany had, the day before, declared war on France and Belgium, following the latter's refusal to allow German troops to cross its borders into France. On 4th August Britain declared war on Germany after an "unsatisfactory reply" from Germany to a British ultimatum that Belgium should be allowed to retain its neutrality.

Over the following 52 months almost 9 million servicemen and women on all sides of the conflict would be killed and

This service is available for residents in Edlesborough, Dagnall and Northall who are struggling with local public transport. We have

a team of volunteer drivers from these 3 villages who are willing to give up their time to help others in need of this service. These drivers provide a door to door service, eg, they will take you to your appointment and then return you home.

We only charge the cost of the fuel and parking charges if applicable. The mileage rate we are using is 40p per mile and we have £1 admin fee to help with insurance etc. Some charges may be refunded for certain people, please enquire for further details if you need more information on this. Our drivers only receive this cost of their fuel, they give their time for free! Ideally we need 48hours notice of a trip, but there are emergency medical appointments that we may be able to do a shorter notice if required.

a further 7.8 million would be recorded as "missing in action".

Edlesborough Festival? - Amazing!



Don't Cet Burnt by Burglars This Summer

Advice to help secure your home - from the Aylesbury Vale Community Safety Partnership

Whilst Aylesbury Vale is a low crime area, there can be a risk of burglary to people's homes if they leave windows and/or doors open in the warmer weather and if their home looks unoccupied when they are on holiday. Sometimes the last thing we think about is home security when we're about to head off for the sun.

As a result, the partnership (comprising the police, local councils and other agencies) has prepared a pocket sized card containing a range of crime prevention tips to help stop residents of the Vale being victims of this crime and a handy holiday check list to assist people secure their home before going away and to ensure they don't leave signs they are not at home. The cards are available at animal kennels, camping equipment outlets, coffee shops/cafes, doctor's surgeries, libraries, pharmacies and travel agents. Police Community Support Officers will also carry the cards with them.

Key messages to help prevent burglary include:

- Keep the boundaries to your property secure such as by locking side gates.
- Make sure windows and doors are locked when going out and at night.
- Ensure front doors and windows are locked when you are out in the garden to stop 'sneak in' burglaries.
- Fully lock UPVC doors with a key don't just lift the handle.
- Don't advertise on social networking sites that you are going on holiday.

During his journey to see the Komodo dragon John learned that islanders leave out food for them, at the side of their houses standing on stilts. The dragon is, in fact, a huge lizard. It has teeth which are replaceable all its life and poisonous saliva which can kill other animals. In fact, Komodo dragons will kill and eat each other and, on occasions, do the same to human beings. There are fewer than 4,000 of them, although they are not considered an endangered species. They are valuable to the islanders in attracting tourists. What a fascinating journey this had proved for John, who had obviously loved every minute of it on his way to seeing the massive Komodo dragon.

Later in the month a number of members visited Kew Gardens, and spent a lovely day in the sunshine. They returned tired, but very happy, after such an enjoyable outing..

Vespula vulgaris (The Common Wasp)



This is the wasp which we mostly come into contact with depending upon where you live. In the picture above, the wasp on the left is the male, the one in the middle is the queen and on the right is the worker. Different species of wasp can be identified by their mask, (shown the queen in the picture above), and the markings on their abdomen. The face usually has an anchor mark and the malar space (the distance between the eye and the jaw) is very short. Antennae are black at the base. Thoracic stripes are parallel sided. Four yellow spots at the rear of the thorax. Nests in holes in the ground and in buildings. Nests are made by the wasps scratching on wooden matter and mixing this with their saliva to form a paper vellowish shell on the outside and tiers of harder honevcomb type floors on the inside. Wasps build a new nest every summer, and only use the nest for one season. In late summer more male and queens are born, the males fertilise the queens and then the workers and the males die and the queens over winter in the old nest (There can be up to 2000 queens in a large nest) The following spring the queens leave the old nest to build a new nest and the old nest is never used again. A pest control treatment for wasps is carried out by applying an insecticidal dust / powder to the nest/entry point, the wasps walk in/on the dust and carry it through to the nest where they proceed to lick it off of themselves and therefore die. The procedure is very quick but the wasps may take 24-48 hours to die off depending on the size of the nest. Please call Jane at IMC Pest Control for help, advice and treatment on-:

Edlesborough Book Croup The Northern Clemency by Philip Hensher

This month, we faced a mammoth task. Philip Hensher's novel The Northern Clemency is 700 pages long, covering twenty years from 1974 up to the 1990's. The narrative follows two middle class families who live opposite one another in a street in the leafier part of Sheffield. The book begins on the day that the Sellers family move in to their house because of Bernard Seller's new job with the Electricity Board. He, his wife Alice and their children Sandra and Francis, have moved north from South London and are finding their surroundings strange. On the day of their arrival, there is a crisis in the Glover household opposite: Malcolm, head of the house, has left home, leaving his wife Katherine and three children. Daniel. Jane and Tim. to cope with the debris of a failed 'welcome to the neighbourhood' party for the Sellers family. Malcolm mistakenly suspects his wife of having an affair; she has recently gone back to paid employment at a local florists and is obsessed with its owner This sets up the framework of the book, as it covers the next twenty years of their everyday lives in Sheffield against the political backdrop of those times. The children grow up and find their separate ways in the world, Katherine and Malcolm struggle with their marriage and the two families' stories merge from time to time. Philip Hensher is a journalist and an English professor of Creative Writing. He moved to Sheffield from South London at the age of nine and we must presume that the character of Francis Sellers is based on himself and that the book is semi autobiographical.

Our book group found the book over long and tedious. The many characters

were sketchy and not fully drawn, with little description to help us fathom their part in the overall plot. Even the main characters of the two families were given very little physical identity. We found it very hard to become involved with them or their stories. There was a huge amount of unnecessary detail and plot lines that did not connect which made it hard to know quite what Mr Hensher intended. 
Degreef Weether Steefon (AONE) Weather Conditions for June 2014

How to Deal with Debt



Jonathan Vernon Smith is the Sony Award winning mid-morning show presenter for BBC Three Counties Radio. During his consumer hour he helps listeners with their

consumer problems and now shares his advice with you.

It is a sad reality that most of us are in debt these days. With the high cost of housing, it's perhaps unsurprising that people are having to borrow more money than they really should. For many, this debt is perfectly manageable. However, it only takes a problem like losing your job, or ill health to suddenly turn manageable debt into an utter nightmare.

If you are having financial difficulty and realise that you are unable to meet your debt responsibilities, the most important thing to do is to face up to the reality. As tempting as it may be to bury your head in the sand and ignore the demand letters, it is simply going to make the problem much much worse.

When you have accepted the situation, you need to sit down and look openly and honestly at the money you have coming in, and the money going out. Even if the prospect is thoroughly depressing, you need to understand exactly what the numbers are before you go any further.

At this point, I would advise contacting the companies you owe money to and explaining the situation. They may be able to give you a 'payment holiday' until you get yourself back on your feet again. They are also much more likely to be helpful if you've been open and honest with them rather than ignoring them and hoping they will simply go away. Remember, they want their money, so it's in their interest to work with you as opposed to against you. When you've worked out how much money you can put towards your debts, you then need to prioritise them. The most important debts are: mortgage or rent arrears, gas and electricity arrears, council tax arrears, court fines, income tax or VAT arrears and TV licence arrears. If you fail to pay these, you could lose your home, and in the most extreme circumstances, could end up in prison.

The less urgent debts include: benefits overpayments, credit cards and loans, water and sewerage bills (you can't be cut off for water debts), student loans, loans from family and friends and parking penalties from local authorities. That's not to say that you shouldn't bother trying to pay them, but these should be at the bottom of the list.

Hopefully, with careful budgeting, balancing and communication, you'll be able to manage your debts until you get back on your feet. However, if you simply cannot pay what you owe, then there are some options for you. However, be aware they do not come without costs.

Solutions such as debt consolidation, or even bankruptcy can be the only way out for some people but please look at the pros and cons before committing.

I would always advise that you contact your local citizens advice bureau or the debt charity 'Step Change' on 0800 138 1111 before making any further decisions about the management of your debt.
