One of the good things about village ministry is being able to meet with people socially at various community events. There are the annual events like Edlefest in June, St Mary's Village Carnival in July and Heritage Open Days in September. And there are more regular times such as the Coffee mornings at St Mary's. We meet on the first Saturday of each month (except July when St Mary's Village Carnival takes place) for delicious home-made cakes and scones, coffee, tea and chat. The Book Swap is open for people to bring a book and exchange it for another one, to meet the Book Swap Team and to talk about books they've enjoyed or would recommend to others. And there is a raffle. It is a great way to catch up with friends and to make new ones and has become a real community event.

Continuing this theme of meeting, greeting and sharing, on 21st April at St Mary's we are launching an exciting new initiative on a Sunday morning called Café Church. This will combine coffee, croissants and chat with worship in a new way. The aim is to create a relaxed and welcoming space for all ages to meet. The worship element will be informal in a relaxed café style setting. There will be Bible readings, prayers, a couple of songs/hymns and the chance for reflection. Over coffee and croissants, we will have the opportunity to chat to each other.

After the first Easter, when Jesus had ascended to heaven to return to his Father, his followers continued to meet together for prayer and companionship. The followers of Jesus increased in number as more people heard the message and the word of God continued to spread. You can read all about this in the Acts of the Apostles written by Luke who also wrote one of the four gospels. At that time there were no church buildings. They didn't have a set form of worship and the early Christians met in houses, probably of those wealthy enough to have room to accommodate a number of people. Large groups may well have had to split up into different venues to enable everyone to fit in. In the early days, the Lord's Supper also known as Holy Communion took place in the course of a communal meal. Everyone brought what food they could and it was shared together. Meeting and eating, sharing food and sharing worship were at the heart of the early church. The Lord's Supper, or Holy Communion, is still central to the life of the church today, but it is a more formal and ritualised affair than in the early church.

The introduction of Café Church links back to those early days of meeting, eating and worshipping together in a less structured and formal way than most church services. It is an opportunity to come and explore, to find out more about Jesus in a relaxed setting. We hope you will come and join us for Café Church, which will take place on the third

Sunday of each month at 10am, starting on 21st April. As one advert for Café Church puts it, why don't you give it a shot? With every blessing for Easter,

### Advertising in the Parish

Under Buckinghamshire Council's Devolved Services EPC is obliged to remove illegal fly posters from all street furniture. Anyone wishing to display Charity event signage should request permission from Edlesborough Parish Council via clerk@edlesborough-pc.gov.uk Please ensure you send a copy of the signage, the number of signs you wish to erect and the proposed locations. Buckinghamshire Council has set out rules for Charity Signage which includes:

- 1. Signs are not to be erected more than two weeks before the event and are to be taken down immediately after the event.
- The signs should be at least 1 metre from any junction and not obstruct any visibility splay, footway, or vehicular access; nor shall they be placed in such a position as to contravene any traffic regulation order or impede fire hydrants, inspection covers or Statutory Undertakers' apparatus.
- 3. The maximum size of the signs is to be 1.0 square metre.
- 4. Any claim on the Local Council resulting from any incident involving the signs will be referred to the person/organisation that erected the signs. It is advisable that suitable cover against any such claim is provided by an appropriate insurance policy.

Failure to comply with any conditions specified in this permission will result in the removal of the signs and, in accordance with Section 149 of the Highways Act 1980, any costs incurred may be recovered from the promoting body.

At the time of writing this report Council is aware that decisions on the two applications have been delayed again.

- 23/02966/APP Change of use to retail convenience store including associated external alterations, plant equipment, parking, and servicing area, 2 Pebblemoor Edlesborough Buckinghamshire LU6 2HZ – new agreed expiry date 12th April 2024
- 23/02884/APP Erection of a commercial building for MOT and Car Service Centre, under Class B2 use N M J Motorhouse Tring Road Edlesborough Buckinghamshire LU6 2EQ – new agreed expiry date 4th April 2024.

Council is monitoring the applications for any further updates. Should the Case Officer be minded to approve application 23/02966/APP it is highly likely that it will go to the Development Control Committee for determination, given the unprecedented number of objections to the application.

#### **Grass & Hedge Cutting in the Villages**

Now that the spring has arrived the cutting of the grass verges will resume. EPC requests that parishioners do not park on the grass verges as this causes damage to them and inconveniences the contractors. EPC reminds all parishioners whose hedges border the pavements that they are required to ensure that their hedges are kept well-trimmed, ensuring that the maximum pavement width is available for pedestrians, pushchair, and wheelchair users.

The main terms of the grant are very straightforward.

- The purpose for which the grant is made must be in the interest of Edlesborough Parish that covers the residents of Edlesborough. Dagnall and Northall.
- EPC will determine the size of the award up to a maximum of £500.
- We will not award funds for activities that have already taken place.
- Any publicity covering the activity funded must mention EPC's involvement.
- Following the award, recipients must make a short presentation at the Annual Parish Meeting. Applications will be reviewed at any time during the year and awards to successful applications made in each quarter beginning in April of each year. The total funding available is limited. 



## **Seasonal April Recipes**

## Roasted Cauliflower & Chickpea Coconut Curry

#### **Ingredients**

1 large cauliflower, cut into florets

4 tbsp sunflower oil

2 tbsp black mustard seeds

1 tbsp cumin seeds

6 cardamon pods, seeds only

400g can chickpeas, drained

2 onions, finely sliced

5 garlic cloves, finely grated

thumb-sized piece of ginger, finely grated

1 tsp ground cumin

1 tbsp ground coriander

2 tsp turmeric

½ tsp chilli powder (optional)

400g can coconut milk

300ml vegetable stock (vegan, if needed)

To serve

1 lime, juiced

handful of roughly chopped coriander


1 green chilli, sliced (optional)

cooked rice poppadums, naan or flatbreads

#### Method

Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Tip the cauliflower, 1

tbsp of the oil, mustard



Meanwhile, heat the rest of the oil in a shallow saucepan or wok. Fry the onions with a little salt over a medium heat for 10-15 mins, until golden. Tip in the garlic, ginger and spices and cook for 3-4 mins.

Pour in the coconut milk and stock, bring to a simmer, then tip in the roasted cauli and chickpeas. Simmer for 5 mins and add the lime juice. Top with the coriander and chilli, if using, and serve with your choice of sides.

## Rhubarb & Custard Cake

### **Ingredients**

1quantity Barney's roasted rhubarb (see recipe, below method)

250g pack butter, softened, plus extra for greasing

150g ready-made custard

250g self-raising flour

½ tsp baking powder

4 large eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

250g golden caster sugar

icing sugar, for dusting

#### Method

Make the roasted rhubarb first, carefully draining off the juices before you let it cool. Butter and line a 23cm loose-bottomed or springform cake tin. Heat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4.

Reserve 3 tbsp of the custard in a bowl. Beat when cool.

the rest of the custard together with the butter, flour, baking powder, eggs, vanilla and sugar



until creamy and smooth. Spoon one-third of the mix into the tin, add some of the rhubarb, then dot with one-third more cake mix and spread it out as well as you can. Top with some more rhubarb, then spoon over the remaining cake mix, leaving it in rough mounds and dips rather than being too neat about it. Scatter the rest of the rhubarb over the batter, then dot the remaining custard over. Bake for 40 mins until risen and golden, then cover with foil and bake for 15-20 mins more. It's ready when a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Cool in the tin, then dredge with icing sugar

come out in May, but are very pretty. They are being slow to establish themselves so I shall have to be patient waiting for them to multiply.





### **Potholes**

### Central Beds - How they deal with them

When we receive a report of a pothole, or when our highways officer identify an issue on their inspection routes, we carefully examine the pothole to decide how urgently it needs repaired. We use our Network Maintenance Management Plan to do this. But, it does usually depend on the damage to the road, how busy the road is, and what is the best use of our resources. Other factors which contribute to the priority of making a repairs include the depth of the pothole, the size, the location, the volume of traffic and the speed of the road.



### What are temporary repairs?

We use temporary repairs in wet or icy conditions as a permanent repair would not work in these conditions, the hot material would instantly cool before enough compaction could be achieved and the ice or water would prevent the repair bonding to the road. When the weather is better we do endeavour to make permanent repairs although this does take more time and resource to carry out. In some cases a series of pothole may be a sign that there's an underlying issue with the road surface and further treatment may be needed. In this instance we would use a temporary repair.

### Why do we use the Jetpatcher?

After a period of bad weather when we need to repair a large number of potholes shortly we may use the Jetpatcher, also known as the Velocity Patcher. The Jetpatcher can make pothole repairs in just two minutes which allows our team to carry out repairs without closing the road, meaning less disruption to the public. The lifespan on the repair will depend on the location, the volume of traffic and the weather when repairs were made but studies show that some Jetpatcher repairs can last for up to five years.

### There have been potholes on the road for a while, when will they get repaired?

If the reported pothole does need attention but does not pose an immediate danger to the driver, it may be cost effective to plan longer lasting repair work. This is the Asset Management approach we use to manage our road network. We may be planning further works in the area and the pothole in question will be fixed as part of an overall programme of work.

Through this approach we are able to stop roads getting into a condition where a more expensive preventative treatment is needed or where potholes or other defects might become more common.

This approach means that you could see us working on roads that are, on the face of it, in a better condition than others, however this is done to maximise the long term benefit for the money that we have.

### How often do we check reported potholes?

We will monitor the state of current known potholes during monthly inspection routes of main roads to ensure that the pothole has not worsened. If it has then we will step in and carry out the repair which is best for the location.

In 2023 Central Beds repaired 159 potholes in Eaton Bray

# Daton Bray W.I.

Our first meeting of the year struck a positive note with a talk by Jez Elkin from the Greatmoor Energy Waste facility for Buckinghamshire. He explained

the process by which household waste which cannot be recycled is burnt in a way that recovers enough energy to power 40,000 homes. This waste processing also has the advantage of diverting household waste from landfill. Jez went on to give us some fascinating, and sometimes shocking, statistics about the amount of household waste we are all generating.

At our February meeting, members were asked to consider the four Resolutions which are being put forward as the next national Women's Institute campaign. They focus on the chronic shortage of NHS dentists, the impacts of poor housing, the effects of gambling advertising and improving outcomes for women in the criminal justice system. Members then voted on the Resolution they would like to be the focus of the next campaign.

### A Bright New Addition at Whipsnade Zoo

A little 'ray of sunshine' has been born at Whipsnade Zoo in Bedfordshire. An Endangered François' langur was born to mum Lulu and dad Wang in the early hours of Saturday 17 February. In contrast to the adult François' langurs monochromatic coats, infants are born with shocking orange hair. The flame-coloured monkey, which currently spends most of its time cuddling into Mum's dark black hair, was born as part of a European Endangered Species Breeding Programme (EEP) - an internationally coordinated conservation initiative which aims to boost the numbers of species that are threatened in the wild.



Whipsnade Zookeeper Amanda Robinson said the team were ecstatic when they saw Lulu cradling her bright orange baby at the weekend. Amanda explained: "It's believed the babies are born with bright orange locks so that parents can easily spot the youngster when they're being cared for by the troop. Over time this hair will fade to black. The bright orange hair certainly makes it easier for keepers and visitors to spot the new addition!"

François' langurs are listed as Endangered on the IUCN Red List of threatened species. Native to China and northern Vietnam, their numbers have continued to fall in the wild, making the birth internationally important. Amanda added: "Sadly, in the wild the number of François' langurs are plummeting, so this newborn really is a ray of sunshine and a sign of hope for the species."

### Baby Porcupine 'Quill' Melt Your Heart

A porcupine family at the UK's largest zoo has grown from three to four, with a spiky new baby joining the prickle. Mum Kimya, gave birth to the baby, known as a porcupette, on February 13 at Whipsnade Zoo. Zookeepers won't know whether the porcupette is male or female until the tiny tots first health check, so in the meantime keepers have named the three-week-old Dakari, which is a Zimbabwean name meaning rejoice.

Porcupines are pregnant for 94 days, and this is Kimya's second baby to be born in six months, with her last infant Oti, arriving in August 2023. Keeper Felicity Ball said: "not only has Kimya been caring for her six-month-old Oti, but she also now has a tiny new baby to care for as well. Thankfully Dad, Winga, has been helping with the young".

In the wild Cape porcupines often live solitarily, before coming together to breed and rear their young, remaining monogamous for life. While porcupettes do have quills when they're born, they're soft at birth, but become hard and prickly a couple of hours after the baby is born. Felicity added: "It was an incredible surprise for the team to see Dakari curled up next to Mum, Dad and their older sibling Oti the next day."

"Dakari is very confident, pottering around the family's cosy indoor den following Mum everywhere she goes. They've been trying out new things each day, like nibbling on a

bit of sweetcorn, one of the family's favourite snacks. While visitors may see the group having their 'breakfast' in our afternoon, they're most active at night".

Cape porcupines are nocturnal rodents, native to central and southern Africa. They usually venture out when the sun starts to set, but thankfully our night vision cameras help us to monitor the prickle – which is a group of porcupines – when we're not on the ground," she said. # What to do in the Carden in April



April's here and spring has sprung at last! As the weather warms up and early flowers start to bloom, all of a sudden there's a load of jobs to do outside.

This month, there's plenty to sow and grow in your garden and greenhouse. But there's lots more to do besides sowing and planting out. Here are your main garden jobs this April:

### **Timely Tips**



Start with these four garden tasks this month:

- Order annual plants like geraniums, begonias and petunias online now for summer bedding and hanging basket displays - it's your last chance!
- 2. Give your greenhouse a thorough scrub (if you haven't already) with hot soapy water. This will get rid of pests and diseases and let in more light.
- Prepare beds for the growing season.
   Dig in a 5cm (or more) layer of compost or well-rotted manure. You can also work in a general-purpose fertiliser, such as pelleted chicken manure, or fish, blood and bone.
- Check your patio plants aren't drying out. The warmer weather will quickly affect soil moisture levels - try mixing water storing granules with compost to improve water retention

in containers.

#### In the flower garden



Here's what to be getting on with in the flower garden this month:

- Lift and divide established border perennial plants now, like Hostas, to improve vigour and create new plants for your garden.
- Pinch out the tips of fuchsia plants and sweet pea plant shoots, to encourage bushy growth this summer.
- Divide primroses once they have finished flowering.
- Plant rhododendron bushes once the threat of frost has passed, and the ground is moist.
- Move evergreen trees and shrubsnow, provided the soil isn't frozen or waterlogged.
- Feed trees, shrubs and hedges with a balanced, slow-release fertiliser, by lightly forking it into the soil surface. Roses, in particular, are greedy plants and will greatly benefit from feeding as they come into growth.
- Tie in climbing roses.
- Check any tree stakes and ties to make sure they're not cutting into the trunk.
   Loosen any that are tight, to allow the trunk some room to expand.
- Prune your penstemons now cut back all the old shoots to the base, provided there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves.
- Finish cutting back any dead foliage

- on perennials and ornamental grass plants (if you haven't done so already), to make way for new growth.
- Prune Forsythia as soon as they have finished flowering, cutting back to strong, young shoots.
- Trim winter-flowering heathers as the flowers disappear, to prevent plants becoming leggy.
- Tie in new honeysuckle and clematis stems. These plants will be putting on growth now, and you'll need to train them along their supports.
- Continue to remove faded flowers from winter pansies to stop them setting seed. This will encourage flushes of new flowers throughout the spring.
- Deadhead daffodils and tulips as the flowers finish, but leave foliage intact, allowing it to die back naturally.
- Apply a layer of mulch around your perennials and biennial plants, trees and shrubs before the hot weather arrives. Use organic matter such as well-rotted manure.

### In the vegetable garden



Get busy with these vegetable garden tasks this April:

- Prepare vegetable seed beds by removing all weeds.
- Dig a 5-cm (or more) layer of compost, well-rotted manure or green waste into beds.
- Cover prepared soil with sheets of black plastic to keep it drier and warmer in preparation for planting.
- Build raised beds to take the bending out of growing vegetables.
- · Harvest asparagus spears when

- they're no more than 18 cm tall.
- Support pea and bean plants now.
   For quick and easy pea supports, push some twiggy sticks around your plants.
- Thin carrot seedlings to achieve goodsized carrots; do this in the evening when fewer carrot flies are around.

### In the fruit garden



Here's what to do in the fruit garden this month:


- Protect fruit blossom from late frosts by covering them with horticultural fleece on cold nights.
- Spray the emerging leaves of peach and nectarine trees to prevent peach leaf curl. Sheltering your plants from the rain will also help reduce the risk of peach leaf curl.
- Mulch fruit trees with well-rotted manure or garden compost, taking care not to mound mulch up around the trunk.
- Top-dress patio fruit-trees with fresh compost and a slow-release fertiliser.
- Feed raspberry canes, fruit bushes and fruit trees to encourage good crops this season. Apply a slow-release fertiliser around their base.
- Try hand pollinating peaches and nectarines with a soft-bristled paint brush for better crops this year.



# Paton Bray lifetory

### The Chequers Public House, Moor End Eaton Bray

John Fountain was a wealthy cordwainer (shoemaker) in Eaton Bray in whose house was to be found "my large oval table, one chest with drawers" besides beds and bedding and at least one pewter dish in 1780. He must have been a man of standing in the village, for he held the office of overseer of the poor in 1757.

It was probably his son, another John Fountain who combined the job of cordwainer with being the

innkeeper at The Chequers and apparently very profitably. Most of his property was left to his son, another John, in his will of January 1815. This will is the first document to mention The Chequers and states that his son John was to let the testator's widow Mary live with him in the "dwelling house called The Chequer" for two months after

the testator's death without paying rent. John Fountain senior's will was proved on 26th August 1816.

By 1840 The Chequers appears to have belonged to a family named Mawley. An abstract of a mortgage tells us that in April that year Henry Mawley, esquire and Anna Maria Mawley, spinster joined Mary Burr and James Horseman in conveying a

cottage at Moor End, Eaton Bray called The Chequers, amongst many other licensed properties, to Edward Burr and his trustee William Senhouse Gaitskell. Edward Burr was a Dunstable brewer and mortgaged all these premises in 1841.

In 1843 Dunstable Brewery was put up for sale by auction and The Chequers was Lot 40. It comprised a tap room, a parlour, a washhouse, a small cellar, three bedrooms and an apple room. Outside were: "A good Yard and Barn (used as a Cow-house and Stable), Garden, Well of Water and small orchard containing together about Half an Acre". The owner also had two common rights for one cow each or one horse together. The annual rent was £12.

Sadly the sale particulars are not annotated with the names of the buyers. We know that in 1849 the licensee was Jabez Thorne as his wife Caroline gave evidence against someone passing forged currency. Apparently Joseph Janes came to her and told her a man named Rollins had been passed a bad half crown, and that if the same men were to offer her money, she should take it. John Deeley came in soon after and asked

her for gin, of which she had none. He then asked for ale and paid with half a crown. Janes duly came in and examined the half crown and detained Deeley until Constable Thorogood arrived.

The countywide licensing register of 1876 states that Jabez Thorne was still the owner of The Chequers, but he now lived at Albury. By the time of the countywide register of 1891 the owner was William Mead of Luton and he leased the house to the Dunstable Brewery run by the executors of Benjamin Bennett. The countywide register of 1903 gives Dunstable Brewery as the owners and states that The Chequers was in fairly good repair but was "rather untidy". It was 154 yards from nearest licensed house (The Victoria Arms) and had one front, one side and one back door.

The Rating and Valuation Act 1925 specified that every building and piece of land in the country was to be assessed to determine its rateable value. Eaton Bray, like much of the county, was assessed in 1927 and the valuer visiting The Chequers found it still owned by Dunstable Brewery, who had charged a rent of £20 per annum since 1920. The premises comprised a bar, a tap room, a parlour, a cellar, a kitchen and four bedrooms. Outside stood a brick and tiled store; a slaughterhouse measuring 16 feet 6 inches by 11 feet, a brick and tiled copper house (for boiling water), a loose box, a workshop and a garage. Jabez Thorne had been a butcher as well as a publican; it was not unusual for a licensee to have another source of income besides their licensed trade.

The valuer commented: "Dirty place but Buses stop here". Another hand has written: "Not a bad looking house outside but filthy inside. Better tenant could evidently do a greater trade. Lack of personality here. Dunstable buses pass". The tenant, William Tompkins, said takings were £10 per week. Trade was six barrels of beer per month, six dozen "bottled stuff" per fortnight and ten gallons of spirits per year. The valuer observed: "[Takings] Probably more as tenant said at first one barrel a week and takings £5 only". Obviously the tenant did not want to be thought to be doing too good a business as that would affect his rates.

A number of farm buildings lay nearby including a brick, weather-boarded and tiled four stall stable, two weather-boarded and corrugated iron piggeries and a store shed and a weather-boarded and slated pig sty in an orchard along with two weather-boarded and corrugated iron hovels. The orchard itself measured just under a third of an acre and had a "few old trees". Most likely these were plums for making prunes, seemingly common crop in Eaton Bray.

Mann, Crossman and Paulin Limited of Whitechapel took over Dunstable Brewery in 1938. The public house closed in 1989 and was later demolished, modern housing now occupying the site. At least, however, one of Eaton Bray's earliest known pubs is remembered in the new development's name: "The Chequers".

### **Baby Rhino Charges into the World**

A giant bundle of joy has been born in Bedfordshire at Whipsnade Zoo. The southern white rhino calf, tipping the scales at 45kgs, was born on March 7, to mum Jaseera and dad Sizzle at the UK's largest zoo. The baby boy was born after a very quick four-minute labour to 13-year-old Jaseera - who was pregnant for 16 months with the calf.

Rhino keeper Mark Holden said: "This is Jaseera's first baby, and it's been great to see her maternal instinct kick in. Jaseera has been nursing the calf and has been very protective of him. All the signs of a perfect rhino mum." Within two hours of being born, the tiny rhino started to take his first wobbly steps with Mum close to his side.

"Southern white rhinos are born with over-sized, rubbery feet, which they 'grow into', so the calf was understandably quite wobbly when he first started to walk. But he's a fast learner and a week later he was zooming around, exploring his cosy indoor den."

Mark added that the new calf was extremely precious: "Sadly, these magnificent creatures are still being hunted in the wild. The poached horns are primarily used for traditional medicine in Asia, due to mistaken beliefs that the horns have healing powers. Last year in South Africa alone around 500 white rhinos were killed for their horn, that's more than one a day."

According to the IUCN, there are 10,000 mature southern white rhinos left in the wild, with numbers continuing to fall. ZSL, the conservation charity behind Whipsnade Zoo, estimates the illegal wildlife trade is worth US\$23 billion a year. ZSL is working around the world to stop the illegal trade through pioneering border detection in epicentres of illegal wildlife networks, establishing anti-poaching patrols and working closely with governments around the world.

The new calf was born as part of the European Endangered Species Programme (EEP), to help create a genetically diverse and healthy back up population in conservation zoos like Whipsnade. Mark added that dad Sizzle, has been a vital member of the EEP. "Sizzle has had 15 calves at Whipsnade Zoo, and those calves have gone on to produce 37 grandchildren around Europe and he's also got 13 great grandchildren. He's an incredible bull." And the little one, will hopefully follow in his dad's footsteps. Visitors will be able to visit the calf and Mum in the indoor dens at the White Rhino house, at Whipsnade Zoo. The calf remains inside for two weeks while the pair bond, before the little boy is introduced to the 'crash' (a pack of rhinos). # The Eaton Bray Village Quilt

### Made by Mary Mayne Displayed in the Lady Chapel, St. Mary's Church, Eaton Bray

In 1983/4 The Quilters Guild of The British Isles challenged their members to make quilts for possible selection to be hung in the Royal Institute of British Architects. This would have approximately 30 quilts selected from around the country. As a member of The Guild (now an Honorary Member), I decided to have a go as I love a good challenge!

My first thought was to go around the village and take photographs of buildings and shops etc. that I felt would tell the story of our village.

Once I had chosen which pictures I wanted to make, I enlarged them up to the sizes I needed and used these as my templates. Working on one photo at a time, I traced each element i.e. the roof, walls, windows etc. and cut out the shapes from fabrics that matched the most with the said pieces. The backgrounds were sewn down onto a linen backing first, sky, trees; foreground etc. then the buildings were pinned in place one by one and sewn around with the sewing machine.

I started making the pictorial blocks using my sewing machine place on the top of a chest of drawers in my bedroom! I had no other space at the time. This meant that I sat sideways to sew, sitting on the corner of my bed! Half of the blocks were made this way, then to celebrate our 25th wedding anniversary my husband transformed the back half of the garage into a sewing room. This made a huge difference and the rest of the quilt was made and put together. The fabric used on the border of the quilt was chosen to represent Wallace's

Carnations, once a huge nursery in the village.


The quilt is machined together but all the quilting is done by hand.

Once it was finished it was hung in the Luton Museum, Wardown Park along with about 30 other entries. Judging was done by Quilters Guild Committee members (I think) and two quilts were chosen, I was thrilled when one of the chosen was my quilt.

It was then hung in the Royal Institute of British Architects in London for 2 or 3 months.

It was also my first entry in The Great British Quilt Show and won a Merit award, and from there it was featured in a BBC2 programme, Pieced Pictures.

To now have the quilt hanging in Eaton Bray's St. Mary's Church is an honour and something I have hoped for many years.



# **Stanbridgeford Station**

Stanbridgeford was the only intermediate station on the LNWR line from Leighton Buzzard to Dunstable. It was built just north of where the Eaton Bray junction of the A505 bypass is now.

The line opened on 1st June 1848. Stanbridgeford first company appeared in the timetable 1860 in October when it opened to both passenger and goods traffic, although some revenue shown in the company record

for the station from October 1849 indicating that it was an unofficial stopping place before the station was built. The station was used by visitors to the Tottemhoe Knolls, a popular tourist attraction with its11th-century Norman motte and triple bailey castle. It was especially popular with Leighton Buzzard residents who took to the countryside in great numbers, so much so that in 1919, when 700 people arrived to take the train back from Stanbridgeford, the stationmaster had to call for extra coaches from Leighton Buzzard. The station served the villages of Stanbridgeford (now known as Stambridge), Tottemhoe, Eaton Bray and Tilsworth.

The station had a substantial two-storey house which incorporated the booking office on the up side of the line adjacent to the level crossing. There were two short



slightly staggered platforms laid with small square stone blocks. The platforms had conventional ramps at the east end and steps at the west end. Both platforms had small timber waiting rooms, each with a canopy. There were two other timber buildings on the down platform adjacent to the waiting room. An 8-lever ground frame adjacent to the crossing on the down side controlled the crossing and access to the small good yard. The yard was on the up side of the line and accessed to the west of the station. It comprised two sidings, one located along the

back of the up platform running diagonally across the goods yard serving a coal yard. There was brick weigh office and weighbridge at the entrance to the goods yards and cattle pens at the west end of the yard. The goods yard handled mainly coal, livestock. agricultural products and market garden produce strawberries including and carnations from

Wallace's at Eaton Bray. In a good year it was reported that 10,000 dozen blooms a day were dispatched from the Wallace Nurseries to all over the UK, via Stanbridgeford station. Ducks are also known to have been transported from Stanbridgeford by Eaton Bray breeders.

To the west of the station private sidings served Forder & Son's Sewell Lime Works and the Tottemhoe Lime & Stone Company at Totternhoe Quarries. Increased traffic led to new sidings and a crossover being installed in 1916.

After closure to passengers in 1962 the station remained open for goods traffic until 1st June 1964 with a private siding remaining in use after that date. The track through the station remained in use until 15th April 1965 serving the adjacent Totternhoe quarries.

In 1968 the station was used as a set for the opening sequence of an episode called Noon Doomsday of The Avengers TV series starring Patrick Macnee and Linda Thorson. A forty-strong film crew worked at the station for two days. The buildings were demolished shortly afterwards in October 1968, and the track was lifted at the station in February 1970.

Hardy, hungry, excellent composters. The humble woodlouse munches its way through just about anything it can find and is an expert in recycling nutrients.

Woodlice are terrestrial crustaceans belonging to the order Isopoda, there are 30 species in Britain five of which are often found in garden. They are oval shaped with light grey dimpled exoskeletons with a length of 1.5cm. Their bodies are made of seven segments with a pair of legs per segment. The young are small and white. Female woodlice carry their eggs on their underside. When the eggs hatch, the juveniles stay with their mother for a few months until they mature. Each female can have up to three clutches of between 12 and 36 eggs per year.

Woodlice, also known as slaters and pillbugs, are abundant animals in most healthy gardens and greenhouses. They are largely beneficial and cause little or no damage to healthy plants.

Woodlice don't wee, they release ammonia gas instead. This means they can smell quite bad in groups, earning them local names like 'stinky pigs'.

Woodlice eat deadwood, leaf litter, dead animals, fungi, fruit and even its own faeces. As they feed largely on damp decomposing plant material they are therefore part of the biodiversity that helps nutrient recycling in the garden. They look for food at night and hide in rotting wood and under

rocks during the day. Gently lift stones in woods and gardens to see if there are any woodlice hiding underneath. They stay in cool places because they are very prone to drying out. Large numbers often occur in compost heaps, where they help break down plant material.

Woodlice do not usually damage healthy plants, they can however become associated with damage which has other causes such as slug damage or plants that have died and begun to rot. Woodlice occasionally damage very soft plant tissues, such as seedlings and sometimes strawberry fruits. Holes in older, tougher plant material will have been caused by something else, such as slugs or caterpillars. The common rough woodlouse is not currently considered under threat in the UK.

### Dagnall Weather Station (AONB)

### Weather Conditions for February 2024

Elevation: 450 ft - Latitude: 51° 50' 13" North - Longitude: 0° 33' 34" West

February was a wet, mild and overall dull month. It started dry and mild for the first five days, then the pressure dropped, leading to our wettest day on the 8th with 22.81mm of rain. On the 9th, the pressure started to rise again, along with the temperature, to reach 17.4°c on the 15th – an unbelievable temperature for February. The mild temperatures and rainy days continued to the end of the month. The mean temperature was 8.6°c and it only dropped below zero over the 24th and 25th for a short period of time. It felt like the rain never stopped with 118mm (over 4½ inches), which is 212% of the 17-year average. That is a lot! Although, looking back over 17 years of data, I discovered that February in both 2014 and 2020, we had more than 130mm of rain. The Met Office has confirmed that it was the warmest February since records began.


